back to her grandparents' farm near Lake City, the 55 acres show a tremendous diversity. From sections using native wildflowers and indigenous shrubs to formal gardens with carefully planned views, every aspect of the garden brings delight to the lucky viewer.

The entrance includes a whimsical stumpery and beautiful drive through many different



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fields circling around the swimming pond, while the exit is a lovely allee of crepe myrtles. Standing as a sentinel over the property is an authentic fire tower that was disassembled, moved, and re-erected. Near the entrance is the well-appointed Fire Tower Center, which is used for classes, events, workshops, and group lectures.

Several themed gardens offer a profusion of flowers, shrubs, native grasses, and indigenous trees in carefully planned and meticulously executed designs. One area flows seamlessly into another, with plenty of benches and unique seating for strollers to sit and enjoy the views.

The formal garden, surrounded by tall clipped hedges, is a work of art in itself. Laid out with wide grassy walkways and a central fountain, it includes unusual specimen plants as well as more familiar favorites.

The State of Agriculture in S.C.

The only constant in life is change, and that certainly applies to agriculture. Our industry is seeing unprecedented changes, and they are moving at tremendous speed.

'What does this mean for South Carolina? Agribusiness, which consists of agriculture and forestry, has been recognized as our state's largest industry with an economic impact of \$34 billion. The question to ask is where agriculture is headed in the future.

Technology and information are two of the biggest influences in agriculture today. For example, the latest farming equipment boasts GPS technology that allows a farmer, like my nephew, Landrum, to harvest his crop within a 16th of an inch on the row he planted. That accuracy was unheard of just a few years ago. Equipment is bigger and more efficient, with 16row planters and harvesters saving time in the fields. That saves on the inputs, as well as makes agriculture more sustainable economically and environmentally.

The biggest impact this year is the pressure that has been placed on commodity prices due to the laws of supply and demand – higher yields and lower worldwide demands. Another impact is the new farm bill, which has changed the way producers are provided safety nets for yield loss.

The purpose of the Forestry Commission's seedling program is to provide a superior and wide-ranging selection of genetically improved products to land owners for everything from timber and Christmas tree production, wildlife plantings and windbreaks, to streamside buffers and wetland mitigation.

STAX, Farm Bill Workshop Set for Nov. 18

Cotton farmers are encouraged to attend one of the educational meetings the National Cotton Council has scheduled to provide its members with in-depth information regarding insurance options for cotton under the Agricultural Act of 2014.

The meeting will provide an in-depth look at the new Stacked Income Protection Plan (STAX) and the Supplemental Coverage Option. Coverage levels, expected yields, and premium rates will be covered in detail in order

to better equip producers with the information necessary to evaluate the insurance options for 2015. An update on overall farm bill implementation and a question and answer session will be included.

The South Carolina meeting will be held on Nov. 18, beginning at 9 a.m., at the Family Development Center, 210 Brooks Boulevard, in Santee. It is co-hosted by the South Carolina Cotton Board, SC Farm Bureau, Southeastern Cotton Ginners, and Southern Cotton Growers.

Innovative Collaboration Grows Crops & Produces Bio-fuel

Two Midlands bio-fuel companies are collaborating to grow bio-crops and to sell liquid biofuels across the state. ATP-SC and Midlands Biofuels are working together to produce clean energy and decrease the state's reliance on imported fuels.

Founded by Joe James, ATP-SC is developing a pilot torrefaction plant in Allendale, which will convert plant and wood material ("biomass") into a variety of bio-products. Torrefaction is a carbonization process which makes the properties of the biomass more comparable to coal. The biomass is then made into pellets or briquettes which are sold to end users. ATP-SC's \$3.65 million pilot plant will produce roughly 13,000 tons of torrefied material per year.

Midlands Biofuels of Winnsboro, owned by Joe Renwick, converts waste cooking oil into clean biodiesel fuel. Biodiesel is a renewable fuel that can be used in any diesel engine without modification. The company collects waste cooking oil from hundreds of restaurants and recycling centers.

A grant from the S.C. Department of Health &

Environmental Control allows Midlands Biofuels to provide biodiesel fuel across the state at a discounted price. The advantages of using biodiesel are increased performance and power and decreased emissions. Since South Carolina imports 98 percent of its diesel and gasoline fuels, using local biodiesel means less reliance on imported fuel.

This unique program allows Allendale County residents the opportunity to recycle their waste cooking oil rather than pouring it down the drain. With every gallon recycled in the county, one gallon of biodiesel can be produced.

The collaboration between the two companies, made on National Bio-Energy Day, could inspire similar ventures across the state, in which farmers can grow canola and bio-crops on the same farm. Participating farmers can purchase bio-diesel for their tractors at a \$1 discount from Bio-Joe for a limited time and would also benefit from added revenues from crop rotations.

State of Agriculture

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Its overall impact is yet to be determined as farmers try to interpret the bill for their individual operations. The direct subsidies farmers have received over the years have been eliminated.

Not only is agriculture our biggest industry, but we count on our farmers to feed us and our families. The state's 8,000 livestock and poultry farms produce nearly 300,000 cattle, 224,000 hogs, 4.2 million layers, and 226 million broilers. We are doing more than just feeding our state, as increased exports of soybeans and wheat from the port reflect substantial opportunities for S.C.

Soybean acreage is up to 488,000 acres, the highest it's been in some time. The I-95 corridor is the top producing area for soybeans. It's looking to be a good year for beans, even though the prices are always a challenge.

Peanuts are extremely important in Orangeburg and Calhoun counties, as the top producing counties in the state. We have some 106,000 acres in production statewide. Three new buying points are up and running for a total of 12 buying stations in our state.

Irrigation is becoming more and more common. As farmers like to say, "Irrigation controls your destiny." Putting the precise amount of moisture at exactly the right time can mean the difference between crop failure and crop abundance. This is especially true for peanuts. We saw drastic differences on our own farm this year.

The number of farms in our state is constantly changing, as some farms consolidate and others, sadly, go out of business or change directions. But a new and very bright note is the number of farms reporting income from agritourism. More than 580 farms reported income of \$5.5 million from visitors who came to their farms to buy local produce, tour their facilities, or have hands-on interaction. From pumpkin patches to corn mazes, to pick-your-own vegetables and on-farm restaurants featuring home-grown food, agritourism numbers are climbing

People love getting back to their roots, and teaching their children that milk comes from cows, not the dairy section of the grocery store, and that vegetables are grown in fields. Agritourism farms that let people walk through their fields and pick peaches, strawberries, or tomatoes, among other edibles, are offering lessons that don't come in books.

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Even the vegetable garden is designed for beauty as well as for its lush fresh produce in every season.

Several ponds and water features offer even more interesting sights. One of the most unusual is the Spring House, an open air structure with an authentic English thatched roof. The walls are comprised of panels which can be closed for privacy or open to the breezes that sweep over the water.

The formal garden, surrounded by tall clipped hedges is a work of art in itself. Laid out with wide grassy walkways and a central fountain, it includes unusual specimen plants as well as more familiar favorites. Even the vegetable garden is designed for beauty as well as for its lush fresh produce in every season.

Other areas of interest are the pack house, a cut flower garden, the peach meadow, a forest boardwalk, a pine bay,

and the rose field. But the most unique structure is the Green Roof, a 6,000 square-foot maintenance shed that was designed with a sloped, elevated garden on the roof. Grasses, palms, shrubs, bulbs, perennials and annuals offer a stunning display of texture and color.
