AgriBiz & Farm Expo Takes New Approach

Rooted in Tradition,

The S.C. AgriBiz and Farm Expo keeps agricultural unmanned aircraft systems, or getting better and better. The format has changed to allow more demonstrations, more interaction, and more opportunities for farmers to hone their skills in a variety of areas. Agricultural Education, Innovation, and Connections is the theme of the expo, which will be held Jan. 14 and 15 in Florence.

Several optimization clinics—which allow farmers to optimize performance from their

equipment—will be offered on Wednesday, Jan. 14. John Deere, New Holland, Case SC AgriBiz & Farm Expo IH, and other companies are Thriving Through Innovation doing Combine Clinics in the morning, and Hay Equipment Clinics will be offered for cattlemen and livestock producers in the afternoon.

"The idea is for exhibitors and farmers to interact via clinics, demonstrations, and other forums over the two days at the expo. These are opportunities for growers to improve on efficiency and production," explained Jody Martin, Director of the S.C. AgriBiz Expo.

Wednesday is also Youth Day, with Kirby Player of Clemson University taking the lead in coordinating activities. Special programs, clinics, and education will be targeted toward FFA and any student interested in agriculture. The S.C. Department of Agriculture will host the Agritourism Mini Conference this day as well.

time slots, and each exhibitor can do a 10to 15-minute demonstration in his booth throughout the day," Martin said. "Farmers can select what they want to see, and the exhibitor can talk to a dozen farmers at one time and demonstrate their products and services."

Lamb Pot Pie

From S.C. Chef Ambassador Cooper Thomas Victor's Bistro Florence, S.C.

This lamb pot pie recipe is hearty enough to stand up to cold holidays. It also uses biscuits as the topping, so it adds a Southern twist to the dish.

- 2 pounds diced bacon 6 pounds lamb shoulder, cut in 2-inch pieces
- 2 potatoes, washed and cut into 1-inch cubes
- 2 parsnips, peeled and cut into ½ inch rounds2 carrots, peeled and cut
- into ½ inch rounds

 2 sweet potatoes cut
- 2 sweet potatoes, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1 cup celery root, peeled and cut into 1-inch cubes3 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 onion, diced 2 teaspoon fresh thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 cup red wine ½ cup water
- ½ cup water
- 4 cups beef stock 2 teaspoon sugar
- 3/4 cup all purpose flour 10 biscuit dough rounds

Cook bacon over med-high heat until fully browned. Remove the bacon (not fat) and reserve for later. Sautee onion in the bacon fat until translucent. Add flour and cook over low heat for 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add liquid ingredients and bring to boil; stir constantly.

Once at boil, turn to low, and add all remaining ingredients. Cook at a soft simmer until the lamb is very tender. Stir periodically. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Pour into a shallow pan and let cool to room temperature. Spoon cooled stew into oven-proof bowls. Top each bowl with biscuit dough (enough to cover). You may need to use several pieces of dough. The rustic look is just fine. Bake the prepared bowls in oven at 350 degrees until the biscuits rise and are golden brown.

Clemson's Special Blue Cheese is Back

Clemson's renowned Blue Cheese, a tasty classic of the South, is once again on the way to becoming a household name.

Clemson Blue Cheese has a fascinating history. The first Clemson University Blue Cheese was cured in Stumphouse Mountain Tunnel in 1941. Today it is produced on Clemson's campus and packaged at Newman Hall.

The boost to the popular cheese came after Watson and Lisa Dorn of Hickory Hill Milk were named to take over production and marketing of the blue cheese. Andrea Meadows of Clemson heads the overall operation.

Both Clemson graduates, the Dorns were already producing old-fashioned whole milk. All of their milk is non-homogenized, which keeps from destroying valuable enzymes. Hickory Hill Milk in Edgefield is a member of the Certified S.C. program.

Dorn said that Clemson had been using homogenized milk all those years, but the rest of the world uses non-

homogenized whole milk for blue cheese. "We knew we needed to tweak the formula," he said. He contacted world-renowned cheese authority Neville McNulton, a native of New Zealand who now lives in St. Louis, to help their cheese maker, Anthony Pounders, perfect the recipe.

McNulton visited Clemson several times to oversee the process. By April of this year, the cheese reached the specific goals he had set, and the first batch was set to age. Today the cheese is made exclusively from fresh, old-fashioned milk from Hickory Hill, and Pounders has become a Master Cheesemaker.

Clemson Blue Cheese is an artisan cheese,

made the old fashioned way. Each 288-gallon vat makes a batch of about 240 pounds, which is then salted, waxed, and aged for six months. When it is ready, each hoop is scraped and packaged by hand. Each lot is kept separate, and strenuous record keeping assures quality at every step.

The first batch of cheese was ready for sale in September. It is available at The '55 Exchange and East Side Food Court in Clemson, online from the website, and at Bi-Los in the Upstate. Sysco Food Service is handling distribution to restaurants.

"It's amazing the response we've gotten


from high-end restaurants," Dorn said. "Many years ago, some of them advertised that they only used Clemson Blue Cheese, and they are very excited to get it again." Since the Dorns took over production and distribution, they had the name "Clemson Blue Cheese" trademarked.

Watson is also responsible for Clemson Blue Cheese salad dressing, which is

being co-packed by Dukes Sandwich Company, another Certified S.C. member. "We take them the crumbles, and they blend it for us, using Hickory Hill buttermilk. Then it comes back here for sale," Dorn explained. Gerrad Bruce of Duke Sandwich Co. is also a Clemson graduate.

Due to special vacuum-sealed packaging, Clemson Blue Cheese has a long shelf life. It can be stored in the freezer or refrigerator for up to three months. Once opened, it will store for up to three weeks. It is shipped year-round.

Juniper's Butternut Squash Bisque with Crispy Kale

From S.C. Chef Ambassador Brandon Velie Juniper Restaurant Ridge Spring, S.C.



2 butternut squash peeled, seeded, diced

- 2 teaspoons unsalted butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon turmeric 2 tablespoons butter ½ cup onion, chopped
- ½ cup onion, chopped ½ cup apple juice 1½ cups heavy cream

1 ½ cups Half and Half

Salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In medium bowl toss squash, 2 teaspoons melted butter, cinnamon, turmeric, and nutmeg until squash is evenly coated. Place on greased baking sheet and roast in oven until tender, approximately 30-40 minutes.

Melt butter in medium pot over medium heat. Add onion and saute for 3 minutes. Add squash and all other ingredients, heat to simmer, and cook for about 20 minutes. Puree with an immersion blender. Add salt and pepper to taste. Serve in bowl with crispy kale as a garnish. Makes 4 servings.

Crispy Kale

1-2 fresh kale leaves, stem removed, cut into thin strips 1 tablespoon unsalted butter Salt and pepper to taste

Place butter in medium saute pan over medium high heat. Once butter melts add kale and saute rapidly, moving around in pan often. Once kale gets crispy take off flame.

Christmas Eve Clam Chowder

1 stick butter

1 8 oz. can minced clams, drained. Save the liquid.

In a large saucepan melt butter and sauté clams for 15 minutes.

3 cans of New England clam chowder

3 cans cream of potato soup

1 quart milk 2 cups Half and Half

Salt and pepper

Reserved clam liquid Simmer and serve.

Blanche's Tomato Pie

This one is a little harder to share because I make it differently each time. I find by using cream cheese the pie is not quite as runny. This summer I had the privilege of serving as a judge for a tomato pie contest. It was a really good idea until about the 10th pie!

However, I found some interesting combinations you might like to know about. Some pies had an egg to help hold the filling together, more like quiche. Some had goat cheese, not my favorite, or bacon. One of the contestants had added hot sauce and topped with Parmesan cheese. I did like that

Here is a rough go at the measurements for my pie. You can find tomatoes at the State Farmers Market year 'round. I think the ones I get at the Market are better than in the grocery store, but I won't swear by it.

19" pie crust

½ yellow onion, chopped, or one bunch of spring onions, diced ice sized tomatoes, sliced and placed on paper towels to drain

1/4 cup fresh basil, julienned

1 cup grated cheese: sharp cheddar, Monterey jack or gruyere

4 ounces cream cheese

1/4 cup mayonnaise

1/4 cup sour cream

Salt and pepper

Frank's Hot Sauce, optional

Mix together the cream cheese, mayonnaise, sour cream, hot sauce and basil and let that sit overnight.

The next day, place pie crust in pan and bake at 350 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes, until slightly brown.

You can sauté the chopped onion but I usually don't. Layer salted and peppered tomato slices, onion and cream cheese mixture. I usually do two layers. Top with grated cheese and bake at 350 degrees for about 30 to 45 minutes.

I actually triple this recipe and line a 9 x 13-inch pan with the crusts, which makes it more like a casserole than a pie. Try your own variations.
