Like many small businesses that start as family operations, Carter and Holmes Orchids is tucked away on a side road near the town of

During the past 70 years, they have expanded their business to include eight greenhouses, and they ship to locations all

over the world. Customers are welcome to browse the thousands of orchids on the premises or to order from the on-line store. Since some orchids can bloom for several months at a time, the showrooms are always full of color.

The company doesn't just sell orchids. "We create the orchids we sell," explained grower Mac Holmes. pollinate, harvest, and germinate new ones. It takes from one to three years to get the new varieties, but we know what we'll get from the parent plants." They also do some cloning, he added.

Orchids grow wild all over the planet, with some 40,000 species identified. The best known are Phalaeonopsis, Cattleyas, and Dendrobium, which each have distinctive characteristics. Some are fragrant, some are not, and they have different reblooming cycles.

Ag Council Tours 'Cow Carousel' in Newberry

The S.C. Agriculture Council headed for Newberry in April for its biannual road trip, with stops at an alpaca farm, a high-tech dairy, an orchid wholesaler, and a U-pick strawberry

Satterwhite Dairy is a 3,500-acre dairy, beef, and row crop farm near Newberry that is sustaining its fourth generation of farmers. Kevin Satterwhite oversees the dairy, which milks 1,300 cows. His cousin Steve manages the row crops, which include crops that feed the cows: soybeans, wheat, oats, barley, and corn for silage.

Their new rotary parlor, which was installed last year, is a carousel for cows. As each of the 60 cows steps onto the moving platform, a sensor reads her ear tag and records all her information. Her name, number, age, and weight are immediately stored as data. Within seconds of being loaded onto the platform, she is washed and hooked to a milking machine. Her production record—the amount of milk she produced that dav-is computed before she steps off the carousel.

As she backs off the platform, another cow replaces her. Using the rotary parlor, Satterwhite can milk 360 cows per hour. The cows are milked three times a day on eight-hour shifts. When their shift is over, the cows stroll back to a modern barn where they can lie down in comfort, with fans and misters keeping them cool. All the food they want is right in front of them.

Homegrown by Heroes

With Memorial Day almost here, it's fitting to recognize a program that honors and empowers our veterans: Homegrown by Heroes.

Homegrown by Heroes was developed by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture in 2013 and has recently expanded to a national level through the Farmer Veteran Coalition. Essentially, Homegrown by Heroes is a marketing program for veterans who own farms. It allows them to sell their fruits, vegetables, food, fiber, and other agricultural products under their own label.

The idea behind the program is that veterans who farm should be able to tell customers that the food and fiber they are buying came from a sérvice mémber. The new labeling program allows farmers and fishermen who have served in the military to use a special logo on their agricultural products and on their signs.

When they see the logo, customers will know that the products were raised locally by a veteran. From the market to the grocery store, the label should add an extra incentive for consumers to buy local. Take a look at their logo at the end of this column - we expect to see it at many farmers' markets and roadside stands across the state.

Edisto Research Center Expands Precision-Ag Program

Clemson University's Edisto Research and Education Center in Blackville has hired a precision-agriculture specialist to help farmers apply the latest technological advancements.

Hollens Free is the latest specialist to join Edisto Research and Education Center (REC) as the center expands its precision-agriculture program, but he won't be the last. The center is hiring a soil fertility/plant nutrition specialist as well, said John Mueller, director of Edisto REC.

Researchers are developing precision-agriculture technologies and management practices to make farming more efficient, Mueller said. Tractors are equipped with GIS/GPS systems that allow precise steering and tracking through a field. When coupled with soil texture maps, they will allow growers to apply fertilizers and pesticides only where needed and at very specific rates. Likewise, irrigation systems with similar equipment can apply very specific amounts of water only where needed. The goal is to cut waste, maximize profit and minimize environmental impacts.

"These farmers have all kinds of technologies on tractors now. They're probably only using 10 percent of the technology that's available to them," Mueller said.

Free's contributions will ensure that farmers capitalize on these investments in technology. He'll also work with Clemson faculty to develop new technologies.

Before joining Edisto REC, Free worked at the experiment station in Blackville. A 2010 Clemson graduate with a degree in agricultural

mechanization and business, Free is pursuing a master's degree in plant and environmental sciences.

"Data management is really big," Free said of the new technological tools available to farmers. "Growers are getting all of this data, but they're not really sure what to do with it. I'll show them how to properly make yield maps and provide training on new

equipment."

Precision agriculture is particularly important in South Carolina, where soil is subject to a high degree of variability that affects crop production. Even small improvements to agriculture and forestry, which represent the state's largest industry with a \$42 billion economic impact, can add millions to the state's economy.

Among recent expansions to Edisto REC's precision-ag program, the center hired computer scientist Joe Mari Maja to develop sensors that can be used to monitor crops for diseases, pests or drought stress. Last year, Maja received Federal Aviation Administration approval to fly drones that could use the sensors to gather information in the field in a fraction of the time it takes now. His work will help farmers pinpoint where to fertilize, irrigate or spray for pests or disease.

Edisto REC has expanded its precision-ag work in the past year with help from investments from the state legislature. Additionally, the center hired ag-mechanization specialist Kendall Kirk last year. He is developing peanut yield monitors, an automated system to manage grain bins and a program to automate a peanut digger that works at variable depths.

Veterans have relatively simple guidelines to follow in order to sign up for the program. The veteran must be at least a 50 percent owner of his or her farm and have received an honorable discharge from the military.

Many of our service men and women are from rural areas, and many grew up on farms. When they leave the service and come home, some of them might work on or even own the family farm. Homegrown by Heroes lets these service men and women know that we support their efforts. We are particularly interested in signing up the younger farmers, since the average age of farmers across our state is 58, and we need the next generation to keep the agriculture industry strong.

The Farmer Veteran Coalition, which works with veterans in the food and farming community, says that about one-fourth of their members grew up on a farm. About half of them lived in agricultural areas, but didn't actually farm. What a great way to allow these honorable men and women to return to their roots.

We think this is a worthy program with significant potential, and we want every county in South Carolina to support Homegrown by Heroes. Several folks have already signed up, including our friend and certified organic beef producer Leland Gibson, a Marine, who heard about the program and immediately recognized the potential impact. Another innovative feature at Satterwhite Diary is the method of milk collection. The milk is pumped across a cooling plate to bring the temperature down quickly, then it flows directly into a large tanker that transports it to a Pet plant in Greenville.

The rapid cooling enhances the quality of the milk, which means premium prices, Satterwhite explained. He personally samples each load of milk before it leaves the farm, then it is inspected again before it is unloaded. Commercial milk never contains antibiotics or hormones. With a lab on site, three herdsmen, a nutritionist, and two veterinarians, the cows receive the best of care, which translates into premium quality

Kevin likes to educate consumers so they understand what it takes to run a dairy. "This is a family farm. We work around the clock, seven days a week, 365 days a year."

Sam Chiodo, a USC Equestrian Team captain, is the AgSouth 2015 Female Athlete of



Alpacas Are Star Attraction

Friendly alpacas were the main attraction at the S.C. Ag Council tour of Carolina Pride Pastures in Pomaria last month. Owners Alicia and Eric Holbrook started and Enc Hobbook statted raising alpacas several years ago. They are one of 11 registered alpaca farms in South Carolina. The animals are used primarily for fiber, as well as being an attraction for local school groups.

Orchids

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Adjacent to the retail shop is an education center, where customers can get an interesting lecture on how not to kill orchids. Holmes explained that orchids are epiphytes, which means they grow on trees. They prefer the mottled sunlight and breezes found in the tree canopy. Their roots dry out quickly, which is essential to their survival.

People kill orchids by overwatering and using fertilizer, Holmes said. He advised customers to put their orchids in bright indirect light and to spritz them occasionally with tepid water, about once a week. "The roots need to dry out between waterings," he emphasized. "If the roots stay wet, they will rot.

The roots should always look dead." Having soil that is too rich is another good way to kill the plants, he said. The fill material needs to be very porous so water can drain quickly.

The main cause of orchids not reblooming is insufficient light. A sunroom is ideal, with the brightest

spot in the house being the next best choice. Orchids do not like direct sunlight.

The orchid expert used the term "benign neglect," explaining that less care is often better than too much. When in doubt, check the website for instructions, carterandholmesorchids.com.
