Thousands Attend Opening of Tryon Horse Park

in prize money at the opening event.

The newest, biggest and most ambitious horse facility in the country is within easy reach of South Carolina riders. In fact, one of the managing partners of the Tryon International Equestrian Center, Mark Bellissimo, lives in Spartanburg.

Bellissimo and his wife Catherine welcomed N.C. Governor Pat McCrory, along with a host of local officials and celebrities, to the center's grand opening on June 6. Country singer Lee Greenwood performed several of his hits for the crowd of 10,000 people who

came to watch a world-class Grand Prix with prize money of \$210,000.

The competitors--who came from all over the country and beyond--raved about the arenas, the footing, and the care that went into designing the facility. With 10 arenas, 850 stalls, permanent vendor cabins, several restaurants on site, and even a complete fitness center, the Tryon center exceeded everyone's expectations.

In his opening remarks, Bellissimo said he and his partners originally planned to invest \$20 to \$30 million to bring the unique resort to reality. Having already spent more than \$70 million--and created 700 jobs in the process--he expects their total investment to top \$100 million.

And all this for horses? Absolutely! Tryon has long been a horse community, with roots going back more than a century. Upstate South Carolina, just across the border, is minutes away from the Mill Spring, N.C. facility.

"We have a vision to increase the hospitality infrastructure," Bellissimo said. The impact of a similar site in Wellington, Fla., which he also owns, generates \$200 million a year.

Charlie Jayne of Chicago, a sixth-generation horseman who has competed all over the world, called the new center "the most horse-friendly facility I've been to. The footing is probably the best in world. They took the good parts from Wellington and added to it. Boom! Here it is."

When asked how many world-class riders would make their way to Tryon, Jayne replied, "Build it and they will come. The classes will get bigger, and five-star status will come."

In fact, after a breath-holding jump-off that had the eight clear rounds competing for top prize money, Richie Maloney of Ireland pulled off the win. His head-long gallop for the last fence had the crowd cheering wildly as his horse, Carrabis Z, cleared the massive jump with a final time of 36.9 seconds.

"This is a huge regional economic impact, and it's important to all of us," Gov. McCrory said of the international venue. "This could have been anywhere in the United States. We salute Mark for his vision. "

Future plans call for an 18-hole golf course, a luxury hotel and clubhouse, and additional houses on site. To put the icing on the cake, Tryon International Equestrian Center has been selected as one of the host sites of the US American Eventing Championships in 2016

Watermelon Field Day July 9

A Watermelon Field Day will be held at the Edisto Research and Education Center in Blackville on July 9. Registration will be at 8 a.m. at the office complex, followed by an indoor session at 8:15 a.m. in the auditorium.

Topics include an overview of watermelon board activities by Matthew Cornwell, a lecture on spraying melons by Dr. Tony Keinath, Tri-Hishtil plant grafting by Bert Lemkes and honey bee biology by Jennifer Tsuruda.

Following the indoor sessions the group will go to the field to look at research projects and variety trials. Certified Crop Advisor and Pesticide License credits will be offered.

The field research tours will include: Bayer Feed A Bee, grafting update, UAV and sensor imaging, and merge and root knot nematodes. The watermelon trial will demonstrate 81 different varieties.

After lunch the group will return to the field and look inside a bee hive. A limited number of bee suits are available. Those not suited can watch from inside the bus with audio from those leading the tour.

Research Farm Focuses on Rice, Vegetables & Grafting

At one time, rice was South Carolina's premier crop. Plantations all across the Lowcountry were devoted to producing thousands of tons of rice, both for use in this country and as exports. But when the rice culture collapsed in the mid-1800s, the land was abandoned. Rice was simply too labor-intensive to survive as a viable food crop.

Fast forward to 2015, at the Coastal Education and Research Center (REC) field day on June 10 in Charleston. More than 150 visitors got a close look at a large trial plot of rice, as Clemson research specialist Dr. Brian Ward explained how today's methods-along with drip irrigation, improved applications of nitrogen and new varieties-are improving rice culture.

Explaining the System of Rice Intensification, Ward said higher yields are possible with

less input of water and fertilizer. Planting dates and the application of nitrogen vary so that researchers can determine how to make rice flourish. One of the hybrids, for example, has shorter foliage so that the wind doesn't blow the stalks over.

He also demonstrated a piece of equipment known as a "flamer," which is used to kill clover and nut sedge between the rows. This modified flame thrower-which is a hand-held wand with a propane torch on the end—eliminates only the grass and weeds that it touches. For larger fields, the flamers can be mounted behind a tractor to kill grass between the rows.

Not only is the Coastal REC testing many varieties of rice, it also has test plots of field corn, sweet corn, tomatoes, and many types of cucurbits, which are members of the melon family. Using different planting dates, for example, affects both productivity and disease-resistance. The center is comparing

35 varieties of sweet corn, including white, yellow, and bi-color.

Center director Dr. Richard Hassell explained some of the latest work being done on grafting. He is studying several lines of native root stock that are hardy and disease-resistant. Grafting has many benefits for producers.

Visitors toured the entire farm, learning about new methods that can make vegetables more profitable. Using data from the test plots, growers can evaluate every aspect of vegetables, from eye appeal to uniformity to color. The center is also doing a trial on varieties of tomatoes which are sold to manufacturers for canning and processing. These tomatoes have less juice and tougher skins than the ones grown for the table.

Results from some of the trials will be shared with The Vegetable Handbook, an invaluable resource for many growers.

Tree Improvement Workshop to Be Held July 25

A field tour and educational program on seedling selection for pine planting in the Piedmont will be held July 25. Included will be a tour of Timberhaven Tree Farm and a program at the National Wild Turkey Federation in Edgefield.

The featured speaker is Dr. Steven E. McKeand, a professor of forestry and director of the Cooperative Tree Improvement Program at N.C. State University.

Topics include tree improvement and forest productivity, genetics, and the loblolly pine 864-288-7618.

In July, South Carolina will be the site of During an emergency training workshop at a mock nuclear event, designed to test the response capabilities of emergency and disaster personnel across the state. Since agriculture would be affected by such an event, the S.C. Department of Agriculture plays an important role in the exercise.

In the mock disaster, HB Robinson Plant in Hartsville would be compromised, with a plume of fall-out spreading across the Pee Dee region. Thirteen counties would be considered at risk, with seven of those designated as host counties.

Response times and the duties of various agencies were covered. The exercise will serve as a pilot project for other states.

Georgia Commissioner Gary Black shared how they are implementing new information technology to provide better customer service. He also told us about their *Feed a School for a Week* program, which is something we want to look at to complement *Farm to School* efforts here in South Carolina. Commissioner Miller, a new face from Texas, told us about ... well, everything Texas.

There were also updates from various speakers on honeybee stewardship, weights and measures, land grant research, a rural challenge strategic plan, and economics, to mention a few.

My presentation touched on some strengths of our industry and some of the issues that we are facing in South Carolina. We have a lot to be proud of, like the 23 percent growth in agribusiness in the Palmetto State since 2006, generating \$41.7 billion and supporting more than 212,000 jobs. I talked about the success of our *Certified South Carolina* program, and how South Carolina's export business continues to expand at a rapid pace. I also shared some of our stewardship activities and some of the ways our department is improving and expanding customer services.

The poultry focus also included for everyone an update on the bird flu issues in the Midwest. The importance of being prepared and working together was the main emphasis.

Our colleagues in Georgia hosted a great meeting, and they pulled out all the stops for the 14 states that were represented, complete with a laser show at Stone Mountain, delicious Georgia-grown food, and a dinner sponsored by the World of Coca-Cola, with great entertainment by some Georgia FFA'ers.

Our country's Southern states truly have so much to be proud of, and we are grateful to our friends in Georgia who provided us the opportunity to work toward a common goal – strengthening and creating new opportunities for our home-grown agribusiness communities.
