Adam's story is unique in that he is a first generation farmer. Modern technology and equipment were vital for his optimal productivity. His greatest investment went toward poultry houses that allow turkeys to walk, eat and drink freely.

"I never thought I could afford the land, but the turkey houses have helped. I couldn't afford to pay for the farm without them," he said.

Adam pointed out that a lot of farmers are aging, but new farmers are having a hard time taking over a farm or getting into the business because they can't afford mounting taxes. He recently received a property tax appraisal that was much higher than state law prescribes for ag use – and far exceeded his budget for the year.

At the heart of this issue is determining whether the county has the right to (a) assess farm structures at fair market value separately from the property upon which they sit, or whether (b) the value of the structures is already included in the rate prescribed for agricultural real property. The tax assessor can select a different tax rate for buildings based on factors like materials, design or the age of the structure.

The escalated assessment on Adam's poultry farm was an unexpected blow that could bring their operation to a halt. As is all too often the case, decision makers who aren't familiar with agriculture may inadvertently place additional hardship on a family farm with the stroke of a pen.

"People are deciding your life," Adam's mother Ann said, adding that outsiders are changing Adam and Jessica's life by interpreting laws inconsistently. His father said that the couple is not asking for a free ride. "They're just asking for what is fair."

With the culmination of recent weather events, agricultural communities are asking: How do we help existing farmers stay above water, and how do we support new farmers who are eager to dive into the ag industry?

Adam offered some suggestions that could help save struggling farmers. First, fair and consistent tax treatment is necessary for farm planning. New technology and innovation should be encouraged, but higher taxes are a deterrent, he said.

"When farmers are not able to sustain operations due to taxes and regulations, they get out of the business. And fewer farms means less produce, more food miles, greater logistical challenges, a larger carbon footprint – which all lead to higher prices for consumers."

Without proper attention to issues like taxes, regulations and insurance, South Carolina will continue to lose farmland necessary to support the state's largest industry-- agribusiness.

Innovation and Technology to Be Highlighted at AgriBiz Expo in January

Today's agriculture is one of the most innovative industries in the world. The SC AgriBiz & Farm Expo next month will again be focusing on innovation and technology.

"We know it has been an extremely challenging year for agriculture," said Jody Martin, executive director of the Expo. "The key to succeeding in the future is how we use the tools we have to improve our farming efficiency; some may say how to do more with less."

"Precision ag tools help farmers be more efficient, which is necessary considering the costs and risks associated with production agriculture," Martin continued. He shared some of the innovations farmers will see at the Expo.

Steven graduated from North Carolina State University's Agriculture Institute with degrees in crop production and agricultural business management. He was president of Southern Soil & Water Inc., a private soil-testing laboratory, before combining his passions for soil and farming by founding GROWERS in 2011. In addition to having spent time in Nicaragua, working with local farmers to improve soil conditions and increase food production, Steven farms several hundred acres of corn, wheat and soybeans in Guilford County, N.C.

He will share ways to use on-farm data more effectively, thus improving the farm's bottom line. This outstanding educational session will begin at 10:30 a.m. Thursday.

Other sessions include a cattle clinic, CAMM certification, Small Farmer Symposium, the Taste of SC, SC AgriBiz Youth Day, the Commissioner's Breakfast, SC Food Truck Rodeo and much more.

The Expo has more than 130 exhibitors, highlighting new technology and specialty products. Farmers will have the opportunity to visit with each of them on a one-on-one basis to find ways to help improve efficiency on the farm.
