Russ Brothers Still Make Their Molasses by Hand

COWARD--Outside the small weathered shed, the raw smell of cooking molasses permeates the air. Rich and earthy, the hot sugarcane juice slowly reduces into a thick, gooey liquid, carefully tended by Marvin Russ and his brother Wilbur. They have been making cane molasses and syrup for nearly 40 years.

Actually, Marvin learned the craft from his father-in-law in the early 1960s. After taking over Old Plantation Syrup in 1978, he designed and built some labor-saving devices, but the process still requires many hours of careful attention and hard work.

The sugarcane is planted in March and left in the field until mid-October. Marvin and Wilbur cut the stalks by hand with fierce-looking cane knives, then haul it back to the shed. There the brothers feed the cane into a grinder, a process that takes several hours. As the stalks are crushed by a heavy roller, the juice dribbles into a large pot. From there it flows through a pipe into a 300-gallon stainless steel vat in the

The fragrant juice cooks, and cooks, and cooks, with one of the Russ brothers constantly stirring the steaming liquid so it won't stick and burn. They also strain out the small bits of stalk that manage to get into the vat.

Marvin and Wilbur spend the rest of the

day and part of the night monitoring the simmering cane juice. It gradually reduces, ever thickening as 300 gallons of juice turns into 30 gallons of molasses.

By the next morning, the product is cool enough to handle. Then it's time to start

"At one time, Coward was the syrup capital of South Carolina," Marvin said proudly. In years past, he and his brother planted about six acres of sugarcane and produced more than 5,000 gallons of syrup a year. The demand for homemade syrup has fallen off over the last few decades. "People got used to the store-bought stuff," he said, his expression indicating what he thought of

He explained the difference between molasses and syrup. Molasses is 100 percent pure, with no additives. True molasses comes from only two sources: sugar cane and sugar beets. Fresh made molasses gets stronger as it gets older, and it has a bit of a

To make syrup, Russ adds boiled sugar water to the molasses in a huge steel pot in the back of the shed, carefully measuring and stirring. His light syrup is exactly 38 percent molasses, with a mild flavor.

Sorghum syrup, he explained, is not a true molasses since it is made from special varieties of cereal grain.

Marvin makes only one batch of molasses a year, and it sells out quickly. The Russ brothers sell their syrup at the State Fair, the Pee Dee Farmers Market, Young's in Florence, and a few other select markets. They ship their syrup across the country.

Old Plantation Syrup in Florence County is one of the few remaining sources of homemade molasses in the state.

- 4. The advertiser's complete name, address, zip code, county, and phone number with area code are required for each ad submitted. However, only the advertiser's name, county, and phone number are listed in the ad.
- 5. Ads may be submitted directly at the SCDA web site. Visit agriculture.sc.gov, select the *Market Bulletin* arrow, then select "POST AN AD TO THE *MARKET BULLETIN*", complete the online form with ad information and submit.
- 6. Ads are published one time. To be repeated in another issue, ads must be renewed before each issue's deadline with all the required information. The deadline date can be found in the top left hand corner of the front page under the *Market Bulletin* header.
- 7. ALL "For Sale" ads must include a price.
- 8. No sealed bids or legal notices for sale will be printed. Notices will not be published for consignment sales.
- 9. Ads are limited to 150 characters or less, this includes name, county, phone number, letters of the alphabet, spaces, and punctuation marks.
- 10. Ads are NOT accepted from commercial entities including, but not limited to dealers, merchants or representatives of commercial establishments, including real estate agents, unless the property in the ad is personally owned by such person. Persons who have business licenses to sell agricultural and non-agricultural items are not eligible to advertise. U.S. Post Office regulations prohibit the publication of commercial ads because of periodical postage privileges.
- 11. The *Market Bulletin* reserves the right to edit and/or verify any and all ads or a notice submitted for publication, and does NOT accept responsibility for ads. Ads are received in good faith. Notifying the *Market Bulletin* of evidence of bad faith on the part of any advertiser would be appreciated.
- 13. Special Rules for specific advertising categories:

Dog Category

Only dog-for-sale notices are published. Such advertisements shall only be published as space permits. Miscellaneous

Raw milk, eggs, butter, and cheese products officially permitted by the SC Department of Health and Environmental Control Dairy Division, but not licensed for commercial sales, will be published.

Seeds Category

All seed advertisements must be accompanied by a copy of a current Seed Lab Test.

\$2.2 Million Available for Land, Wetlands **Easements**

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service in South Carolina will make available up to \$2.2 million to help protect and restore key farmlands, grasslands and wetlands through the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program, a 2014 Farm Bill program.

NRCS will accept applications for funding through Jan. 15 for agricultural land easements and wetland reserve easements. The funding is designed to encourage owners to keep their lands in agriculture and forestry. Through the voluntary sale of an easement, landowners limit future development to protect their natural resources such as water quality and wildlife habitat.

Land easements prevent conversion of productive cropland, grassland, pastureland, and non-industrial private forest land to non-agricultural uses. NRCS may contribute up to 50 percent of the fair market value of the agricultural land easement.

Wetland easements allow landowners to restore and protect habitat for wildlife, reduce flood damage, recharge groundwater and provide recreational and educational opportunities. Eligible landowners can enroll in a permanent or 30-year easement. NRCS pays 100 percent of the easement value for a permanent easement and 100 percent of the restoration costs. For 30-year easements, NRCS pays the landowner 50 to 75 percent of the easement value and 50 to 75 percent of the restoration costs.

'Plant It Forward' Relief Fund Offers Aid to Farmers

S.C. Advocates for Agriculture has established *Plant It Forward South Carolina*, a private relief fund for South Carolina farmers severely affected by the 2015 flood. The S.C. Department of Agriculture, Clemson University, S.C. Farm Bureau Federation and Palmetto Agribusiness Council are program partners with this 501(c)3 organization.

In October 2015, historical levels of rainfall overwhelmed South Carolina. Estimated damage to South Carolina farms is more than \$376 million, with significant crop loss on peanuts, cotton, soybeans and fall vegetable crops that were ready for harvest.

"Since October's flood event, we have heard from countless farmers who are financially devastated and face the very real possibility of never farming again," said S.C. Agriculture Commissioner Hugh Weathers. "Plant it Forward SC is a way for all concerned to help support our state's farmers."

Thanks to generous support from the Farm Credit system nstitutions located in South Carolina— AgFirst Farm Credit Bank, AgSouth Farm Credit, and Arbor One Farm Credit—along with other agribusinesses, *Plant it Forward SC* has already raised more than \$300,000 to aid farmers' recovery. Individuals and businesses are encouraged to support their farm neighbors across South Carolina by donating generously.

Farmers who need assistance must complete an application and present information as proof of crop or livestock loss specifically attributed to the 2015 rain event. For more information, and to apply or donate, visit www.plantitforwardsc.org. The deadline to apply for assistance is Jan. 31.

Congressional Funding Approved for Agricultural Flood Relief

The much-debated year-end appropriations bill included millions in funding to help South Carolina cover losses associated with the recent historic flooding. The funds will be used to aid eligible homeowners and farmers.

Support from Senator Lindsey Graham and Representatives James Clyburn, Tom Rice and Joe Wilson was instrumental for the inclusion of federal dollars for farmers.

Farmers will also be eligible for funds secured for the Emergency Watershed Protection Program, the Emergency Forestry Restoration Program and the Emergency Conservation Program, all through the United States Department of Agriculture.

"We appreciate the leadership of our Congressional delegation to ensure this crucial funding was included in the spending bill. Congress stepped up to provide aid for South Carolina farmers and recognized the need to continue supporting the state's No. 1 industry," said South Carolina Agriculture Commissioner Hugh Weathers.

NRCS Extends Community Assistance to Feb. 29

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service extended the deadline for South Carolina communities seeking financial and technical assistance to protect roads, bridges, houses, and businesses damaged by the state's historic rainfall in early October. The new deadline is Feb. 29.

The Emergency Watershed Protection Program is designed to relieve imminent hazards to life and property caused by natural occurrences in watersheds. The program can be used by a city, county, state agency, or town.

"We extended the deadline to ensure all municipalities and communities in South Carolina, especially in the 24 federally declared disaster counties, have an opportunity to visit our local field offices to learn whether they are eligible for EWP Program assistance," said Ann English, State Conservationist for NRCS in South Carolina.

NRCS announced an initial \$3 million to the following counties: Calhoun, Clarendon, Georgetown, Lexington, Orangeburg, Richland, Saluda, and Sumter. Additional entities have also requested assistance: Berkley and Williamsburg counties, the City of Columbia and the Town of Lexington.

NRČS will pay 75 percent of the restoration costs and the sponsor is responsible for the remaining 25 percent. For more information visit your local NRCS office, all of which are listed at http://offices.usda.gov.
