## STRAWBERRY SURPRISE

### SOUTH CAROLINA'S STRAWBERRY SEASON IS IN FULL SWING

For South Carolinians, strawberry season couldn't have come at a better time.

As COVID-19 cases multiply, so have feelings of dread and uncertainty for many people in the state. But the sweet, bright-red berries hitting roadside stands across the Palmetto State are a sign that nature keeps moving forward – and so do farmers.

Sam Hall, who co-owns Bush-N-Vine Farm ([bushvinefarm.com](http://bushvinefarm.com), [facebook.com/bushvinefarm](https://facebook.com/bushvinefarm)) with his parents, says the 2020 season started about 30 days ahead of schedule.

"We had a milder winter," Hall explains. "And February was wet, but then it was drier in March and April, which is really good for fruit."

Bush-N-Vine sells strawberries at its farm between the towns of York and Clover, as well as at a smaller roadside market in Rock Hill. Demand has been strong at both spots. The company also operates a CSA program and has been taking a lot of phone orders for curbside pickups.

"We've just been picking as fast as we can go," he says.

Ashleigh Forrest and her husband Matt own and operate the strawberry division of Dixie Belle, Inc. ([dixiebellepeaches.com](http://dixiebellepeaches.com), [facebook.com/dixiebellepeaches](https://facebook.com/dixiebellepeaches)) Best known for its peaches, Dixie Belle diversified three years ago after losing some varieties to a cold snap. So far, 2020 is a strong year for their strawberries.

The coronavirus hasn't dampened people's enthusiasm for fresh fruit, Forrest says.

"So far we haven't really seen any effects of the virus at our roadside market," she says. (The company operates a stand at 1500 Highway 191 in Johnston.) "We've had several repeat customers – that makes us feel good, like we have a good product."

"It's been a nice thing to have in this time because people are baking and

cooking a lot," she says. "Good food just makes you feel good – it's something normal that maintains you through this virus."

Consumers should start seeing South Carolina strawberries in some grocery stores any day now.

Because of the early start to the season, supply was a little low in the initial weeks, but it should

be strong by mid- to late April, explains LauraKate McAllister, a marketing specialist with the South Carolina Department of Agriculture.

Asked whether there are any concerns about shoppers avoiding fresh produce in favor of preserved and prepared foods during the COVID-19 outbreak, McAllister says she thinks farm-fresh South Carolina food will resonate with consumers this year.

"I think that people in general are buying frozen food to stock up, but I think people are seeking out ways to support local farmers and opting for fresh and local when possible and when it's convenient for them," she says.

McAllister notes that many farms, including strawberry growers, have quickly shifted to a direct-to-consumer sales model – launching or expanding CSA programs, offering phone and online orders, and touting their roadside stands, where consumers can buy local berries with minimal person-to-person contact.

## HONORING WILLIE M'RAE

This week I want to divert my attention in a part of this column away from COVID-19 to talk about Willie McRae, owner of Boone Hall Plantation, who passed away in early April after a long battle with cancer.

Given the plantation's status as a tourist attraction, it might surprise some of you to learn that Willie was a farmer and Boone Hall is one of America's oldest working farms. He grew peaches for several decades; later, he sold peaches for a number of other growers in the state, opening a farm stand along the highway, hosting strawberry festivals, and even hosting the South Carolina Peach Council's annual auction at Boone Hall.

Years ago when I made a decision that I'd run for the office of Commissioner, Boone Hall was one of the places I chose to make a public announcement.

Willie's father bought Boone Hall in the 1950s and opened it to the public. And the plantation will live on in a special way: In November, Willie put the entire 600 acres into a conservation easement, meaning it will be secure from development – a haven of green space in the rapidly growing Mount Pleasant area. Willie was awarded the Order of the Palmetto in January to honor his contributions to South Carolina history, conservation, and agriculture.

I'm keeping Willie's sister and other family along with friends too numerous to think about in my prayers. I also think about the staff at Boone Hall; they really were like family to him. Like all those who knew and loved Willie, Blanche and I will miss him.

Speaking of Blanche, she should get some kind of award of recognition today. It's our 37<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Meanwhile, our agency continues to chug along – many of us working from home, some doing essential work at the State Farmers Markets and other facilities – as we help farmers through these strange times. We continue to add to our public list of farmers, markets, and wholesalers doing direct-to-consumer sales; you can find the list at [agriculture.sc.gov/coronavirus/local](http://agriculture.sc.gov/coronavirus/local), and email LauraKate McAllister at [landerson@scda.sc.gov](mailto:landerson@scda.sc.gov) if you want to be added. We've also been helping connect farmers with resources and information.

One way you can help us out is by making sure you're seeking out and passing on good quality information. During emergency situations, it's easy for rumors and misinformation to spread quickly. # SC'S STATE HEMP PLAN RECEIVES FEDERAL APPROVAL

COLUMBIA – The U.S. Department of Agriculture approved South Carolina's Hemp Farming State Plan on March 31, 2020 – the same day the application period ended for 2020 hemp farming permits.

More than 350 people applied to farm hemp in South Carolina this year. The South Carolina Department of Agriculture is reviewing the applications and will begin contacting applicants soon. The agency will hold farmer orientations and execute Hemp Farming Program Participation Agreements remotely, with permits released by May 1, 2020.

The State Plan, authorized by the South Carolina General Assembly and the 2018 federal Farm Bill, will end an era of regulatory flux for South Carolina's hemp industry, bringing the state's three-year-old Hemp Farming Program into line with other states and establishing more permanent regulations.

The plan means numerous changes for the state's Hemp Farming Program, including new lab testing methods and stricter adherence to the 0.3% THC threshold that separates hemp from marijuana. It also establishes new reporting and sampling requirements, and mandates that SCDA staff sample every hemp field in the state prior to harvest.

Although the farming permit application period has ended, SCDA is accepting permits for hemp handlers and hemp processors throughout the year. Processors who were permitted for 2019 must reapply prior to May 1, 2020.

Previously permitted farmers who do not obtain a 2020 permit will be required to destroy or sell any remaining hemp in their possession and surrender their permit by May 1, 2020.

## PEANUT BUTTER TO THE RESCUE

After Gov. Henry McMaster closed schools statewide in mid-March to fight the spread of COVID-19, a group of Pee Dee-area peanut farmers donated hundreds of jars of peanut butter to a local school district for distribution to families.

"Peanut butter is good for you, and it's a good source of protein," says peanut farmer and South Carolina Peanut Board member Dupree Atkinson.

Atkinson and two other members of the South Carolina Peanut Board, Neal Baxley and Shane Willoughby, along with peanut farmer David Owens, learned the Latta School District was planning to distribute food to families, and donated jars of peanut butter to help out. The peanut butter was supplied through Peanut Proud, a charitable organization sponsored by the peanut industry.

Nearly 75 percent of students in the Latta district receive free or reduced lunch, according to a WBTW interview with the superintendent.

Marianne Copelan, marketing specialist with the South Carolina Peanut Board, says peanut butter is consistently one of the most requested items at food banks.

"I encourage consumers to donate to Peanut Proud ([peanutproud.org](http://peanutproud.org)), a nonprofit industry organization dedicated to humanitarian efforts," Copelan says. "Together we can help our communities and those who have been impacted by COVID-19."

South Carolina peanut growers will be donating six pallets of peanut butter — some 9,000 jars — to Harvest Hope Food Bank in Columbia next month.



## AMERICAN FARMLAND TRUST LAUNCHES FARMER RELIEF FUND

# FEDERAL RELIEF BILL OFFERS HELP FOR SOUTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURE

COLUMBIA – Last week, Congress and President Trump approved a new bipartisan aid package to address the expanding COVID-19 pandemic. The total relief package includes roughly \$2 trillion to bolster the US economy as we fight the devastating spread of COVID-19 — and offers critical aid to the agriculture industry.

The bill includes:

- \$9.5 billion in emergency funding to the USDA to support agriculture industries impacted by COVID-19, including fruit and vegetable producers, livestock producers, and producers focused on local food systems. We are expecting more information to be forthcoming on how to access these funds.
- \$350 billion for a new Small Business Paycheck Protection Program that could provide eight weeks of cash-flow assistance through 100 percent federally guaranteed loans to small employers who maintain their payroll during this emergency. This is available for businesses with no more than 500 employees or eligible according to existing SBA regulations. This Paycheck Protection Program could provide

8 weeks of cash-flow assistance through 100 percent federally guaranteed loans to small employers who maintain their payroll during this emergency. If the employer maintains its payroll, then the portion of the loan used for covered payroll costs, interest on mortgage obligations, rent, and utilities would be forgiven.

- \$14 billion to replenish USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) borrowing authority. Along with current CCC funding, which is at \$8.5 billion, this would allow USDA to utilize up to \$22.5 billion in CCC related activities such as Market Facilitation Payments and directing funds to Section 32 for produce purchases.
- \$562 million for the Small Business Administration Economic Injury Disaster Loan Program, allowing small businesses to cover expenses such as paid sick leave for employees directly affected by COVID-19. This program is available to businesses with no more than 500 employees, including emergency grants up to \$10,000 to cover emergency expenses directly related to COVID-19, such as paid sick leave for employees directly affected by COVID-19, payroll to retain employees during business

disruptions or substantial slowdowns, meeting increased costs to supply the supply chain, and paying obligations that cannot be met due to lost revenue. This program may not be applicable to all farm enterprises, only agricultural cooperatives, aquaculture enterprises, nurseries, or producer cooperatives that are small under SBA Size Standards.

- \$300 million in Department of Commerce aid to the fishing and aquaculture industries.
- Numerous other funding streams that could benefit South Carolina agribusiness.

"I thank our partners in Washington for recognizing that agribusiness is critical to the continued safety and health of our nation's people, as well as our economy," said Commissioner of Agriculture Hugh Weathers. "The South Carolina Department of Agriculture will be a resource for South Carolina farmers looking to access this crucial aid."

## PESTICIDE CERTIFICATION RENEWAL DEADLINE AND TESTING POSTPONED DUE TO COVID-19

CLEMSON – State officials have adopted an emergency regulation that will give pesticide applicators in South Carolina the opportunity to extend renewal of their operating licenses until the end of the year.

The Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR), a state regulatory agency and part of Clemson University Public Service and Agriculture, made the postponement in response to the COVID-19 outbreak and issued new guidelines for testing, certification and licensure of commercial, non-commercial or private applicators of regulated pesticides.

All S.C. pesticide applicators who were licensed as of Dec. 31, 2019, but have not already renewed as of April 1, 2020, will have their licenses extended through Dec. 31, 2020, if they meet specific requirements.

Applicators must:

- Complete a Clemson DPR-approved, online, two-hour training program during the year.
- Pay the annual license fee as required by law.
- Be subject to a pesticide applicator inspection.

"We recognize that it is essential to maintain both commercial and private pesticide use in public health, agriculture and related areas. These temporary changes were needed in light of the COVID-19 pandemic," said Steve Cole, director of Clemson's Regulatory Services unit, of which DPR is a part. "We're doing our best to see that, despite the changes the outbreak has brought to our

country, pesticide applicators are able to continue serving their vital function."

Renewal, training and testing for 2021 is expected to resume as usual. Up-to-date information will be made available on the DPR website: [clemson.edu/public/regulatory/pesticide-regulation](http://clemson.edu/public/regulatory/pesticide-regulation).

Additionally, guidelines under the emergency regulation also include:

- All in-person applicator certification exam requirements are suspended.
- Online testing is still valid, however, most online testing centers in South Carolina have closed. The Metro Institute will update the availability of the testing centers. The Metro Institute can be reached online at [metrosignup.com/home.asp](http://metrosignup.com/home.asp).
- Nothing in this temporary guidance shall exempt any applicator from complying with all other existing requirements. Specifically, any applicators using or supervising the use of Restricted Use Pesticides during 2020 must be certified and licensed. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has not modified this requirement.
- Similarly, any applicator using or supervising the use of pesticides while performing pest control activities as outlined in Section 27-1085 (L) of the Rules and Regulations for the Enforcement of the South Carolina Pesticide Control Act during 2020 must be certified and licensed. These activities include Aquatic, Turf and Ornamental,

Structural and Public Health. The Clemson University Department of Pesticide Regulation has not modified this requirement.

The changes are being implemented immediately and will remain in effect until further notice. Any changes or updates to these measures will be posted online at the DPR website.

The emergency regulation was adopted under the auspices of Gov. Henry McMaster's Executive Order 2020-08 declaring a state of emergency in South Carolina on March 13.

Pesticide regulation is mandated by the federal government and each state's designated agency is responsible for enforcing pesticide regulations in that state. In South Carolina, DPR works with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to make sure pesticides are used in a lawful manner that minimizes risk to the environment and human health.

The department certifies and licenses individuals, professionals and businesses through state and federal laws and its investigators across the state conduct routine and for-cause inspections on pesticide use and alleged misuse.

DPR is part of the Division of Regulatory Services which is housed within Clemson University Public Service and Agriculture. Including DPR and similar offices for plant industry, fertilizer and seed, Regulatory Services partners with other state and federal agencies like the S.C. Department of Agriculture and Clemson Cooperative Extension to provide regulation through education.
