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HIGH TECH FARMING COMING TO HAMPTON CO.

PROJECT IS “THE BIGGEST ANNOUNCEMENT IN SOUTH CAROLINA’S RICH AGRICULTURAL HISTORY,” SAYS COMMISSIONER

On September 2, Commissioner Hugh Weathers and other state and national leaders announced a major project to be built in Hampton County, near the community of Early Branch. The Agriculture Technology Campus, a 1,000-acre agribusiness cluster, will employ 1,547 people in growing, packing and shipping tomatoes, leafy greens, blueberries and other fresh produce – using a cutting-edge approach called Controlled Environment Agriculture.

The \$314 million Agriculture Technology Campus is a joint venture encompassing multiple greenhouses and hoop-houses, a 150,000-square-foot distribution center, and a

Controlled Environment Agriculture is a technology-based approach to indoor farming that allows growers to minimize space and conserve water while controlling for factors like weather.

For the past three years, the South Carolina Department of Agriculture has been exploring the

large co-packer centrally located within the cluster, which is situated near I-95.

At a Sept. 2 kickoff ceremony, Weathers said the project is “the biggest announcement in South Carolina’s rich agricultural history.”

The Agriculture Technology Campus “has the potential to transform the state through opportunities for agribusinesses, through workforce development and through ground-

breaking research that should benefit our state’s farmers,” he said.

The project brings together several powerhouse agribusinesses – Mastronardi, a Canadian company that sells tomatoes under the Sunset label; LiDestri Food and Drink, which will provide processing, packing, shipping and logistical services; and Clear Water Farms, an experienced indoor grower of leafy greens – along with GEM Opportunity Zone Fund.

potential for Controlled Environment Agriculture to boost the state’s agricultural economy, not only providing new jobs but offering opportunities for existing South Carolina farmers as agribusiness operations build a local supply chain. Growing and sourcing locally grown foods helps ensure food supply chain security, a need amplified during the COVID-19 pandemic, and minimizes operating expenses through co-location.

The LiDestri portion of the project will allow both ATC growers and other South Carolina farmers to process produce making items such as salsa, pesto and other products.

“The opportunity to bring jobs, fresh produce and investment to rural South Carolina, while partnering with some of the best companies in locally grown produce is very exciting. We are thrilled to be part of this partnership and look forward to the opportunities the co-packing facility will bring to the local community. The innovation and vision of our partners will positively affect the South Carolina agriculture industry for decades to

NEW AGE AGRICULTURE

In early September, I was thrilled to be able to announce the Agriculture Technology Campus, a 1,000-acre farming and food processing project to be built in Hampton County. The Agriculture Technology Campus, or ATC for short, will not only comprise one of the largest investments in greenhouses in North America in terms of acreage, but host research to help train current and future farmers to grow crops with less disease and more efficiency. The food processing facility that’s part of the cluster can create new markets for South Carolina farmers.

It’s important to recognize that this project didn’t come together overnight. This announcement is an exciting culmination of research, discussions and collaboration over the past several years. The “South Carolina Team” of SCDA, Department of Commerce, Clemson University, and industry leaders really stepped up to bring ATC to our state and to welcome them to our state.

Controlled Environment Agriculture is a high-tech approach to indoor farming that allows farmers to use less water, less land, less fertilizer and maximize their yields, while protecting their crops from outside elements like our always unpredictable weather, our very predictable

humidity, and even hurricanes. In other words, Controlled Environment Agriculture is perfectly suited for a place like South Carolina.

At the South Carolina Department of Agriculture, we recognized this potential a few years back. Working with the Palmetto Agribusiness Council, we commissioned a study in 2018 to explore the potential for CEA in South Carolina. I even visited the Netherlands, a world leader in this farming technique, in 2018. Did you know that the Netherlands is smaller than South Carolina, yet is the world’s second highest exporter of food? They farm indoors.

We were looking for the right opportunity for a major Controlled Environment Agriculture project in South Carolina, and when Zeb Portanova and his partners came along, we knew this was the one.

It’s been a privilege to work with Zeb and other leaders of the ATC to get them to choose to locate in our state. I am very proud of the collaboration and focus of the South Carolina team that worked to show that our state is open for business – the business of agriculture. I am pleased that ag leadership has welcomed this new phase of farming to our industry. Let’s see what the future holds.

come,” said Stefani LiDestri, CEO, LiDestri Food and Drink, in a company press release.

“This is a historic day for a region steeped in agricultural history,” said GEM Opportunity Zone Fund CEO Zeb Portanova. “I am thrilled to be part of this innovative group looking to grow high quality agriculture across the region. We will deploy sustainable practices such as using recycled rainwater to irrigate our greenhouses while also providing all Carolina farmers access to our state-of-the-art co-packing facility. This will

help pave the way for citizens to visit their local grocery stores, where they will be able to purchase pesticide-free, locally grown produce.”

The Agriculture Technology Campus cluster is projected to increase total economic output in Hampton County by \$551.7 million a year, or \$7.4 billion over 15 years, according to an economic impact study commissioned by the Department. The campus is expected to be operational in 2022.

AGRIBUSINESS ENTREPRENEURS CAN DEVELOP BUSINESS PLAN, LEARN NEW SKILLS

COLUMBIA – The Agribusiness Center for Research and Entrepreneurship (ACRE), in partnership with Clemson Cooperative Extension, is now accepting applications for the third annual curriculum program for agribusiness innovators.

“Over the past three years, our ACRE program has helped dozens of entrepreneurs take their agribusinesses to the next level, boosting innovation and showing the ingenuity of South Carolina agribusiness,” said Commissioner of Agriculture Hugh Weathers.

The six-session program offers an overview of business planning and management, including pre-planning, marketing, pricing, cost of production, profitability and financial statements. Participants will also pitch their business plans to an agribusiness panel for the opportunity to be awarded \$5,000 (\$25,000 total in awards).

“The ACRE curriculum program introduces business planning processes and management skills for starting a successful agribusiness,” said Dr. Nathan Smith, Clemson Extension Economist and Agribusiness Program Team Leader.

“The program has been refined for online instruction and help with writing a business plan,” explained Steve Richards, Clemson Extension Associate and lead instructor.

Program applications are due Sept. 28 and can be found at acre-sc.com. Qualifying applicants

must be South Carolina residents and have an agribusiness idea or product prototype. Individuals selected for the curriculum program must attend virtual class sessions on Oct. 6, Oct. 13, Oct. 20, Nov. 3 and Nov. 10 and the virtual pitch day on Dec. 8. All classes will be taught by Clemson’s Agribusiness Program Team.

“This program is well worth the time and it has directly led to impressive growth for our business and helped us establish some very meaningful relationships in the agribusiness industry,” said Ben Crawford, co-owner of Woodland Valley Mushrooms, who completed the curriculum with business partner Rebecca Goldberg in 2019. “Not only were we awarded a grant through the Curriculum program, but the knowledge we gained there later led to us being awarded a \$30,000 ACRE entrepreneurship grant.”

The agribusiness curriculum program is the second track offered by ACRE’s Entrepreneurship Center. The first track, for established agribusiness entrepreneurs, was completed in June, with seven South Carolina entrepreneurs selected for funding and business development.

CLEMSON FALL FIELD DAYS HELD ONLINE IN 2020, AVAILABLE FOR VIEWING

Clemson University Research and Education Centers (RECs) are holding their first-ever Virtual Fall Field Days this year to inform the public of important research while protecting people from COVID-19.

In-person field days are held annually at each of the University’s RECs. This year, the threat of COVID-19 has forced REC directors to get creative in fulfilling their mission to provide South Carolina farmers with research information that can help them manage their farming operations more efficiently.

“Field days are important for helping get information from our researchers to the public,” said Matt Smith, resident director of the Pee Dee REC. “People who view the videos will get the same, if not more, information as they would by attending an in-person field day.”

In addition, these videos also are a great opportunity to include research from facilities such as greenhouses and laboratories that often are not included in regular field days, Smith said.

Research videos will be posted at clemson.edu/fieldday on the dates for each field day. This information is geared toward growers, producers, agricultural researchers and the general public. The field days are free, online and pre-registration is not requested.

Private applicator pesticide re-certification credits will be offered for participants who view the Edisto, Pee Dee or Sandhill REC videos.

Field day videos were or will be released on the following dates:

Baruch Institute – Aug. 27: Baruch Institute videos focus primarily on undergraduate summer internship research on watershed management planning, carbon and water cycles in cypress swamps experiencing saltwater intrusion, innovative coastal watershed and water quality management, and evaluating microplastics levels in coastal wildlife.

Pee Dee REC – Sept. 3: Crop diseases, nematodes,

pollinators and genetic diversity are among topics discussed in the Pee Dee REC videos, including a discussion about research being conducted to improve insecticide-resistant management plans in relation to corn earworm on Bt corn, and winter oil seed, canola and rapeseed production in South Carolina. Another presentation addresses sustainably producing more nutritionally-dense food with fewer resources to feed the growing world population.

Edisto REC – Sept. 10: Research involving corn, cotton, peanuts and soybeans are featured in the Edisto REC videos. Researchers address herbicide options, nitrogen management, insect control and irrigation practices, as well as information for managing palmer amaranth and variety tests for corn, grain sorghum and soybeans.

Piedmont REC – Sept. 17: Topics from livestock production to precision irrigation to organic crop production and more are featured in the videos for the Piedmont REC. Researchers address peach production challenges when growing peaches in warm, humid climates; peach virology, nutrition and genetics. Other topics covered include: poultry production, ruminant muscle development, new technology used for the Clemson Bull Test and forage quality for dairy cows, and soil and crop fertility.

Sandhill REC – Oct 1: Members of the Clemson Extension Agribusiness Team present a big picture of the ag economy, as well as report on the situations and outlooks for South Carolina corn, cotton, peanut and soybean crops, as well as beef cattle in the Sandhill REC videos. Other topics presented include: lateral spacing and drip tape depth in irrigated soybeans, Callery pear research, headwater stream diversity, suppressing deer feeding injury to soybeans, and establishment and maintenance of pollinator plantings. Additional presentations include using prescribed fire in forested landscapes and the response of Ips beetles to prescribed fire, as well as a longleaf pine spacing demonstration and a report on peach breeding.

TO ALL GROWERS OF COTTON IN THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA

Referendum on Continuation of Cotton Marketing Order Marketing Order No. 12 for South Carolina Cotton (Summation)

An assessment of \$1 per bale of cotton shall be collected from South Carolina cotton producers by the South Carolina Agriculture Commission as provided by law.

.55¢ - Goes to the National Cotton Council for supporting policies for progress in the cotton industry.

.15¢ - Goes to Southern Cotton Growers, Inc., a non-profit corporation authorized to transact business in all the southeastern states.

.30¢ - Goes to the South Carolina Cotton Board which works for you here in the Palmetto State.

As an aid in such collection, handlers, distributors, ginners, and others purchasing cotton from producers shall deduct the amount of the assessment and remit the same to the Commission for the account of the Board, provided that all funds collected shall be forwarded to the Commission, no later than January 31 for the preceding crop year. Penalties will apply to any person, persons, firms, distributors, or handlers violating any of the provisions of this Order and will be subject to the provisions of SECTION 46 17 400 - Violations.

PERSONS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE

The rules governing the eligibility of a grower for voting are as follows:

Any producer who grew and harvested cotton for marketing in the crop year of 2019 may participate.

1. A producer is defined as (a) an owner of a farm who produced cotton or (b) a renter or tenant who produced cotton.
2. A business unit (partnership, father-son partnership, corporation, cooperative, association, estate, firm) may cast only one vote; but each separate business entity is entitled to a ballot.
3. A person casting a vote for a corporate producer must certify that he is an officer or employee of the corporate producer and that he has the authority to take such action.
4. If the ballot is cast by an unauthorized agent of a producer, or by an administrator of an estate, a certified copy of the authority to do so must be attached.

Your ballot must be received/postmarked at the office of the SC Department of Agriculture no later than September 30, 2020, to be counted.

He/she must also be engaged in producing cotton within the State of South Carolina for a period of one year and during that period, having derived a substantial portion of his/her income therefrom. Additionally, candidate shall continue in the production of cotton during their term of office.

District 1 includes the Counties of Clarendon, Darlington, Georgetown, Lee, Sumter, and Williamsburg.
