# GUIDELINES FOR FARMERS MARKETS DURING THE COVID-19 OUTBREAK



Farmers markets play a critical role in providing food access and food security to the community. Additionally, they provide a reliable income source for farmers. During the COVID-19 outbreak, it is essential for markets to take extra precautions to ensure the safety of all parties involved.

#### FARMERS MARKET EMPLOYEES

- 1. Farmers, vendors, and market staff should wear masks and food grade gloves, with frequent changes as they become soiled or contaminated.
- 2. Market employees who feel sick or show signs of illness should remain at home.
- 3. Increase the frequency of hand washing and sanitizing.

### FARMERS MARKET OPERATIONS

- 1. Encourage farmers to bring masks, handwashing supplies, and/or hand sanitizers for frequent use within their own booth space.
- 2. Limit bare hand contact. No handshaking, no hugs. To the extent possible, limit customer handling of food products.
- **3.** Segregate duties behind market tables. Designate one individual to handle money, tokens and coupons, while

others handle the products being sold. Wear masks and food grade gloves with frequent changes.

- **4.** Farmers and vendors who are ill, or showing signs of illness, should stay home. Send a replacement to sell if they are not sick. If anyone within the farm business is confirmed infected with COVID-19, notify the manager and remain home.
- Watch for signs of illness in customers, removing all products they may have touched from their sales tables. Do not remove with bare hands.
- 6. Suspend cooking demonstrations and sampling.
- 7. Encourage customers to adhere to 6-foot social distancing and mask wearing by posting prominent signage.
- 8. Set up booths with additional spacing.
- 9. Cease all non-essential activities at the market.
- **10.** Share on social media the health and safety precautions you are enforcing.

Please check and adhere to all guidelines enforced by the individual farmers market you are visiting.
