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CLEMSON SCIENTIST STUDIES ‘VACCINE’ FOR PEACH TREES

The South Carolina peach industry is a major contributor to the state’s economy and the fruit is a favorite for many people, but a devastating fungus is a constant threat to this jewel of the South.

The honey fungus (*Armillaria tabescens*) causes Armillaria root rot, also known as oak root rot. There are no controls for this disease, which costs farmers millions of dollars each year in crop losses.

Some Clemson University scientists are studying this fungus to help South Carolina peach growers grow more profitable crops. The latest study is led by Sachin Rustgi, an assistant professor of molecular breeding at the Clemson Pee Dee Research and Education Center (REC) in Florence.

Rustgi has received a grant from the South Carolina Department of Agriculture to develop management strategies for Armillaria root rot. This study involves a two-pronged approach, including “vaccinating” peach trees with the tomato yellow leaf curl virus. The virus used for this study has been modified so that it does not cause disease and replicates as it spreads throughout host plants.

“During our study, we propose to modify the tomato yellow leaf curl virus by installing a piece of Armillaria root rot resistant-pathogen that will produce copies as the virus replicates,” Rustgi said. “This will function somewhat like a vaccine on the fungus. We believe this will help stop the spread of the fungus and help make the host plant resistant to Armillaria root rot.”

In addition to “vaccinating” host plants, the study also involves treating surrounding soil with double-stranded RNA (dsRNA) to target the

Armillaria root rot. Results of the tests will be available to growers at meetings and field days. All safety measures will be followed.

“We will be in constant communication with the Environmental Protection Agency during our study and testing,” Rustgi said.

South Carolina is the second-largest peach producer in the United States. In 2020, South Carolina produced 80,000 tons of peach, bringing in about \$113 million in revenue. Additionally, the peach industry creates about 1,500 jobs annually.

However, in the past decade, the peach industry has suffered severe production losses due to unpredictable weather conditions and root diseases, namely Armillaria root rot. This disease worsens with continued replanting in the same orchard.

Armillaria root rot costs peach producers in South Carolina and Georgia more than \$8 million annually.

Rustgi’s study is funded by the South Carolina Department of Agriculture through the United States Department of Agriculture Specialty Crop Block Grant Agreement 21SCBPSC1010-00. A GOOD YEAR IS WINDING DOWN

Hard to believe, but the end of the year is rapidly approaching. When I think back to December of 2020, it’s certainly a step back in the right direction. Yes, COVID-19 continues to present difficulties for farmers and all the rest of us, but there have been many blessings.

My best news of all is that following the Nov. 12 birth of my granddaughter Darby, I now have four grandchildren: Clara, Virginia, Ransom (we call him “Handsome Ransom”), and Darby. Grandchild Number 5 joins us in January. I’m proud of them all and so thankful for the joy they bring to their parents and to Blanche and me. Hope it’s OK with you that I brag a little.

There’s also some good news when it comes to crop numbers. The most recent USDA NASS reports show that it was a great year for South Carolina row crops. Cotton production for the state is up 32 percent from last year. Soybean production is forecast to be up 29 percent, and way above the national number. Corn production for the year is up 7 percent from 2020. I’ll be very excited to hear the yield per acre numbers, as I think we’ll set some records for corn and beans this year.

Our total peanut production is forecast down 9 percent from

2020, but the good news there is those yields were fantastic: a record high 4,100 pounds per acre for South Carolina farmers. That’s a testament to the good work by Clemson University and many South Carolina farmers to improve our peanut crop.

There are a couple other things I want to mention: First, in early 2022 we’ll roll out a handy new card for farmers to show they are eligible for agricultural sales tax exemptions. It’s called SCATE, or the South Carolina Agricultural Tax Exemption program. This card will replace the old paper form, the ST-8F, which you currently have to file with retailers to receive sales tax exempt status. You can apply for your card online starting Feb. 1, 2022 at scatecard.com. Read more about it on page 12 of this issue. This lets us use technology to make this process easier.

And second, I want to thank my friend Buddy Jennings for everything he’s done on behalf of South Carolina agriculture. We recently named a training facility at the South Carolina State Farmers Market in his honor. See some pictures and read a little about Buddy on page 12.

A very Merry Christmas to all of you, and God’s blessings to you in the New Year.

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SC 4-H HORSE PROGRAM CONTINUES TO SHINE ON NATIONAL STAGE

The South Carolina 4-H Horse Program has made a habit of bringing home top-five national awards, and that theme continued at this year’s contest in Louisville, Ky.

Two top-five overall finishes at the 2021 Eastern National 4-H Horse Round-Up at the Kentucky Fair & Expo Center on Nov. 6–7 marked the 14th and 15th top-five national awards during the past seven years for the South Carolina squad.

This year’s team included Aliza Allison (Lexington County), Chloe Margeson (Greenville County), Ethan Willie (Lexington County) and Langley Vernon (Anderson County).

The 2021 event marked the first national 4-H contest for horses since COVID-19 began, so while the Sandlappers competed in the event in person, the pandemic did affect their preparations.

“They attended the state contest in-person, but they studied from then on virtually — they did all their practices virtually — so it was a little different this year because normally we study in person a lot,” South Carolina 4-H Youth Development

Specialist Katie Shaw said. “Also, the kids typically have months to prepare; this time they had a relatively short time in terms of getting a team ready for a national contest.”

The Eastern National 4-H Horse Roundup provides a place for youth to compete nationally while encouraging teamwork and self-confidence and focusing on the 4-H Mission Mandates: Science, Engineering, Technology, Mathematics, Healthy Living, and Citizenship.

Shaw and the team thanked Lexington County 4-H Agent Erika Hwang for her assistance in coaching and chaperoning the team.

“In my time with the horse program, this marks our 15th top-five national title that we have come home with,” Shaw said. “For me, it’s almost like, ‘Whoa, look at that. The program is continuing to have kids and be represented on the national level.’”

“(Aliza) didn’t just have to be a teammate and have a team effort; she was outstanding just on her own,” Shaw said.

Allison said participating in the event not only taught her how to work hard toward achieving her goals, but also connected her with supportive friends.

“I’m grateful for 4-H for equipping me with the skills and confidence to be successful on a national level,” she said. “Over my six years of participating in this contest, I’ve been able to grow as a person and leader.”

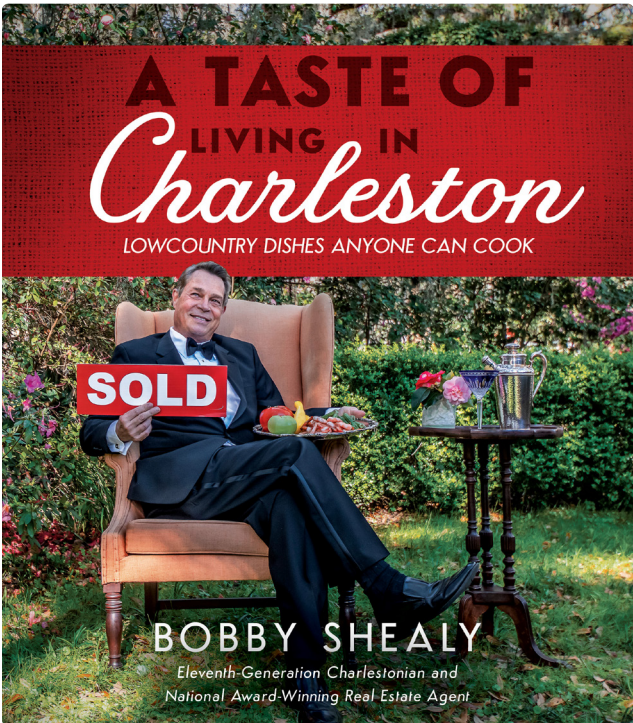

MORE THAN 900,000 TREE SEEDLINGS STILL AVAILABLE FOR SC LANDOWNERS

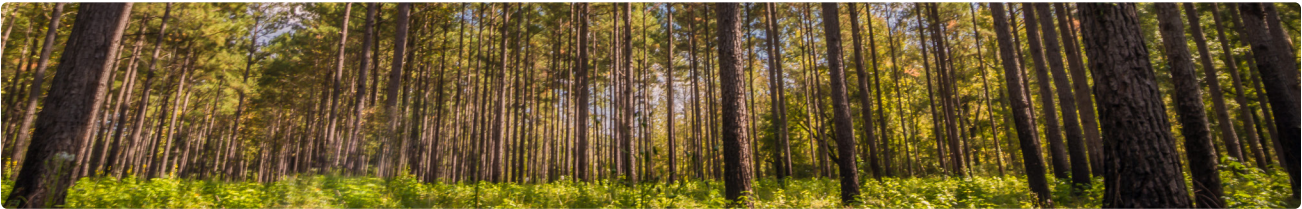

The South Carolina Forestry Commission is encouraging landowners to place their tree seedling orders for winter planting while they are still available.

ArborGen's Taylor Nursery in Edgefield County has more than 900,000 seedlings left for sale at special South Carolina landowner pricing, most of them bareroot loblolly pine seedlings. Among the remaining hardwoods are dogwood, redbud, Southern crabapple and several oak species, including live oak.

"We're trying to find a good home for all the remaining seedlings, preferably in the Palmetto State," said Tim Adams, SCFC Resource Development Director.

As part of its arrangement with ArborGen, the Forestry Commission releases the remaining inventory of unsold seedlings to out-of-state



buyers after the State Forester has declared a surplus. This year, a surplus was expected to be announced Wednesday, Dec. 1.

The purpose of the Forestry Commission's seedling program is to provide a diverse selection of genetically improved seedlings to South Carolina landowners for timber and Christmas tree production as well as for wildlife and wetland habitat improvement.

Contact Taylor Nursery at (803) 275-3578 to place an order, and be sure to ask for the South Carolina landowner pricing, which will only apply to the first 100,000 seedlings ordered annually by each qualified landowner. Landowners must plant the seedlings in South Carolina to be eligible for the special pricing. BIOLOGISTS MAKING HEADWAY ON FLOUNDER STOCKING PROGRAM

CHARLESTON COUNTY, S.C. – In May 2021, lawmakers funded the development of a program to stock young flounder into state waterways. South Carolina Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) biologists are now making headway on the project, with facility renovation plans, genetic sequencing, adult fish collection and visits to flounder-growing facilities underway.

Southern flounder are one of the state's most iconic and sought-after saltwater fish. Biologists recently reported that the region's flounder numbers were at historically low levels – including in South Carolina. Legislators responded this past spring with a suite of legislative changes designed to address the decline, including stocking – which is the practice of raising and releasing young fish into local waterways to help protect the wild population. Lawmakers also took the opportunity to increase some saltwater license fees, a portion of the funds from some of the increased fees will support the new flounder stocking program.

SCDNR's stocking program is one of the oldest in the country. For three decades, staff have followed an ethically responsible, 'do-no-harm' approach to stocking saltwater fish in South Carolina's coastal waters, conducting extensive genetic research to ensure that stocking has no harmful effects on the existing wild population. This genetic information, paired with SCDNR's long-term monitoring surveys that target flounder, allow biologists to determine the ratio of hatchery-raised to wild fish in state waters – and thus how effective a stocking program has been. SCDNR biologists have pioneered and refined the agency's flagship red drum stocking program over three decades, during which time they've have released over 30 million young red drum into state estuaries.

Flounder, however, are a trickier fish. Their short and unusually complicated lives make flounder more challenging to grow than species such as red drum and cobia. Because they're bottom-dwelling

fish, they also require more space than currently exists at SCDNR facilities. Plans are thus underway for significant renovations at the Waddell Center, SCDNR's dedicated facility for stocking research in Bluffton. Staff are also beginning work to retrofit the hatchery facilities at the Marine Resources Research Institute in Charleston to meet the program's needs.

marine scientist Dr. Aaron Watson, who will be part of the team traveling to Texas. "We're excited to visit facilities that are in current production and learn from folks that have had to deal with and overcome many of the challenges we know we will face here in South Carolina."

The team has also coordinated with collaborators from North Carolina to Florida to begin collecting genetic samples from flounder across the region, as well as developing genetic tools that will later allow biologists to monitor the effectiveness of the stocking program.

Lastly, biologists have begun the exciting work of catching and studying the adult flounder, or broodstock, that will eventually be used to spawn and produce young flounder for stocking.

Ethical stocking takes time – biologists

estimate that they will complete baseline genetic, life history and spawning research within three to four years and begin the first small-scale, experimental releases of young flounder by year five.

"While producing southern flounder at a scale for stock enhancement represents a significant challenge, we're excited about the opportunities this program presents to improve upon protocols and expand our stock enhancement footprint in the state," Dr. Watson said.



Southern flounder are at historically low levels across the Southeast; a recent suite of legislative changes aims to address that in South Carolina, including through the development of a flounder stocking program.

At the end of this month, SCDNR biologists are slated to visit colleagues at two different facilities in Texas to learn about the infrastructure used in their flounder stocking program. The Coastal Conservation Association South Carolina has generously offered to cover the cost of two of the three SCDNR staff members that will be traveling to Texas.

"There have been multiple universities and facilities over the last 20-30 years that have worked off and on with southern flounder," said associate

SCDA TO ISSUE NEW CARD FOR AG SALES TAX EXEMPTIONS

In 2022, South Carolina is rolling out a handy new card for farmers to use for agricultural sales tax exemptions.

South Carolina state law offers several sales tax exemptions for items used in agricultural production. For many years, farmers have had to fill out a paper form, the ST-8F, to receive these exemptions.

But after April 1, 2022, farmers will instead show their SCATE (South Carolina Agricultural Tax Exemption) card to retailers to demonstrate they are eligible for these exemptions.

The program is similar to Georgia's GATE card, but unlike in Georgia, South Carolina users do not need to meet a minimum farm income threshold to be eligible.

It's important to understand that state tax law is not changing. Farmers will still be able to receive the same exemptions as before, but after April 1, they'll need a SCATE card to do so.

You can apply for your SCATE card starting February 1, 2022, using our online portal at scatecard.com.

You'll need the following information in order to apply:

- Taxpayer ID Number – personal [SSN] or business [FEIN]
- Valid email address
- Credit card or bank account number

A SCATE card costs \$24 and is good for three years.

You must apply and pay online; there is no paper application.

Retailers will no longer accept the ST-8F. The SCATE card will be the only way to receive agriculture tax exemptions.

EXEMPT ITEMS

Via the South Carolina Department of Revenue, exempt items are:

- Feed used for the production and maintenance of poultry and livestock;
- Insecticides, chemicals, fertilizers, soil conditioners, seeds or seedlings, or nursery stock,

used solely in the production for sale of farm, dairy, grove, vineyard or garden products or in the cultivation of poultry or livestock feed;

- Containers* and labels used in:
 - » preparing agricultural, dairy, grove or garden products for sale; or
 - » preparing turpentine gum, gum spirits of turpentine and gum resin for sale.
- Fuel used in farm machinery and farm tractors;
- Farm machinery and their replacement parts and attachments, used in planting, cultivating or harvesting farm crops, including bulk coolers (farm dairy tanks) used in the production and preservation of milk on dairy farms, and machines used in the production of poultry and poultry products on poultry farms, when such products are sold in the original state of production or preparation for sale. This exemption does not include automobiles or trucks;
- Fuel used exclusively to cure agricultural products;
- Natural and liquefied petroleum gas and electricity used exclusively in the production of poultry, livestock, swine and milk;
- Electricity used to irrigate crops;
- Building materials, supplies, fixtures and equipment for the construction, repair or improvement of or that become part of a self-contained enclosure or structure specifically designed, constructed, and used for the commercial housing of poultry or livestock.

** For purposes of this exemption, containers mean boxes, crates, bags, bagging, ties, barrels, and other containers.*
