ALL SC COUNTIES DECLARED DROUGHT FREE

SC HAD AVERAGE TO ABOVE-AVERAGE RAINFALL TOTALS DURING DECEMBER AND JANUARY

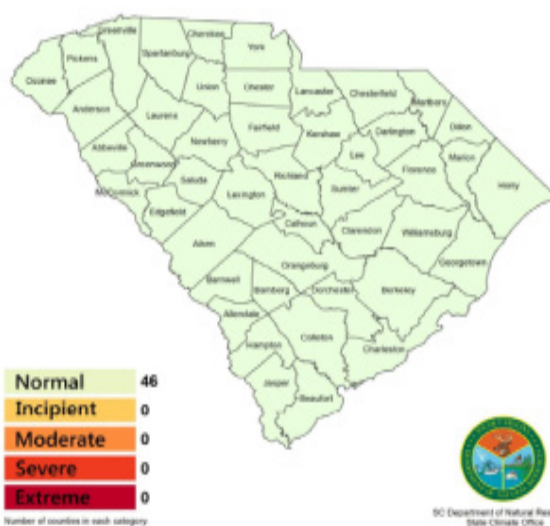

COLUMBIA, S.C. — The S.C. Drought Response Committee met Tuesday, Feb. 1, via conference call to update the drought status of all counties in South Carolina and voted to declare the entire state drought free.

Due to average to above-average rainfall totals during December and January, the Committee removed the incipient drought status of 34 counties. The Committee issued the incipient drought designation in December primarily over a concern for wildfires, but the wildfire threat has diminished over the past 30 days according to the S.C. Forestry Commission. The Forestry Commission responded to 72 wildfires since the start of the year, which is 50 percent fewer than the 10-year average. Leslie Woodham, Forestry Commission fire staff officer, emphasized that while the number of wildfires has been lower than normal, the National Interagency Wildfire Center is forecasting greater-than-usual wildland fire potential over the next three months due to the ongoing La Niña.

According to South Carolina State Climatologist Hope Mizzell, portions of the state have received 90 percent to 150 percent of normal rainfall (7 to 15 inches) over the last 60 days, especially the counties in the central Savannah region and Midlands. Areas along the immediate coast have been the

driest, but their rainfall totals during fall leading into winter were above normal. There was less consensus in the drought indicators for removing the drought for some counties in the Pee Dee Basin and Catawba-Wateree Basin, but the Committee decided to downgrade due to low wildfire activity, improved streamflow levels, normal lake levels and taking into consideration that during winter there is less demand on the state's water resources.



Priyanka More, S.C. Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) hydrologist, provided an update of the hydrologic conditions showing that although a couple of streamflow gauges in the Catawba-Wateree basin, Greenville, and Pickens County still show dry conditions, the recent rainfall and snowfall have improved streamflows in most of the state. The lake levels for the major reservoirs in the state are maintained close to normal. The groundwater levels are also at or above-normal status. The current and the forecasted cooler temperatures along with reduced evapotranspiration should continue to help the overall streamflows in the state.

The South Carolina Drought Response Committee will continue to monitor conditions, and since some counties are still teetering on the edge of drought, another call may be needed in early March.

FUNDING 101

Our Grants Administration folks at the Department get a lot of inquiries from farmers looking for funding to start or expand a farm. Now, federal and state government grants typically fund projects and research, not people or businesses (including farms). Generally, a recipient must be an IRS-designated-nonprofit 501(c)3, cooperative, commission, university, or unit of local government to qualify for a federal/state grant. Our Specialty Crop Block Grants, for example, can go to a producer association but not to individual farmers.

We do, however, administer several cost share grants that help reimburse small farmers for certain farming enhancements. The Cold Storage Cost Share Grant, for example, reimburses farms part of the cost of installing a Cool Bot cold storage set-up. And the Market Development Trade Show & Educational Conference Cost Share Grant helps farmers take advantage of certain networking/promotion and educational events. You can visit agriculture.sc.gov/grants to learn more about these and other grants.

Also, our Agribusiness Center for Research and Entrepreneurship (ACRE) is a bit of an exception to what I just wrote. ACRE's Advanced Entrepreneurship program offers funding and resources for South Carolina agribusiness entrepreneurs through

a competitive process each spring. And our Curriculum track offers training for beginning agribusiness entrepreneurs. Visit acre-sc.com to learn more about ACRE. We have assisted some fascinating projects over the years.

In other recent agriculture-related news, you may have heard that USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service announced 22 cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza in wild ducks shot in Colleton County, South Carolina. This follows two earlier detections of bird flu in wild ducks in Colleton County this year. HPAI has also recently been detected in wild birds in Florida, North Carolina, and Virginia – and now in a commercial flock in Indiana.

I've been staying in touch with Clemson's Livestock Poultry Health team and State Veterinarian Dr. Michael Neault, and their advice to producers remains the same: Review your biosecurity practices. This includes keeping wild birds away from your flock, reporting any unusual sickness or deaths in your flock, and taking steps to minimize potential spread from farm to farm. When we face something like this, I'm proud of the way South Carolina agencies and organizations work together on behalf of agriculture. Thanks to our state and federal partners for all you're doing for South Carolina farmers.

USDA ANNOUNCES CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM SIGNUPS FOR 2022

Columbia, S.C., Jan. 26, 2022 – Agricultural producers and landowners can sign up soon for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), a cornerstone conservation program offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and a key tool in the Biden-Harris Administration effort to address climate change and achieve other natural resource benefits. The General CRP signup will run from Jan. 31 to March 11, and the Grassland CRP signup will run from April 4 to May 13.

“We highly encourage farmers, ranchers and private landowners to consider the enrollment options available through CRP,” said Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Laurie Funderburk. “Last year, we rolled out a better, bolder program, and we highly encourage you to consider its higher payment rates and other incentives. CRP is another way that we’re putting producers and landowners at the center of climate-smart solutions that generate revenue and benefit our planet.”

Producers and landowners enrolled 4.6 million acres into CRP signups in 2021, including 2.5 million acres in the largest Grassland CRP signup in history. There are currently 22.1 million acres enrolled, and FSA is aiming to reach the 25.5-million-acre cap statutorily set for fiscal year 2022.

CRP SIGNUPS

General CRP helps producers and landowners establish long-term, resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees, to

control soil erosion, improve water quality and enhance wildlife habitat on cropland.

Meanwhile, Grassland CRP is a working lands program, helping landowners and operators protect grassland, including rangeland and pastureland and certain other lands, while maintaining the areas as working grazing lands. Protecting grasslands contributes positively to the economy of many regions, provides biodiversity of plant and animal populations and provides important carbon sequestration benefits to deliver lasting climate outcomes.

Alongside these programs, producers and landowners can enroll acres in Continuous CRP under the ongoing sign up, which includes projects available through the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) and State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE).

CLIMATE BENEFITS

Last year, FSA enacted a Climate-Smart Practice Incentive for CRP General and Continuous signups, to better target CRP on addressing climate change. This incentive aims to increase carbon sequestration and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. CRP’s climate-smart practices include establishment of trees and permanent grasses, development of wildlife habitat and wetland restoration. The Climate-Smart Practice Incentive is annual, and the amount is based on the benefits of each practice type.

Additionally, in order to better target the program toward climate outcomes, USDA invested \$10 million last year in the CRP Monitoring, Assessment and Evaluation (MAE) program to measure and monitor the soil carbon and climate resilience impacts of conservation practices over the life of new CRP contracts. This will enable the agency to further refine the program and practices to provide producers tools for increased climate resilience.

MORE INFORMATION ON CRP

Landowners and producers interested in CRP should contact their local USDA Service Center to learn more or to apply for the program — for General CRP before the March 11 deadline, and for Grassland CRP before the May 13 deadline. Service Center staff continue to work with agricultural producers via phone, email, and other digital tools. Due to the pandemic, some USDA Service Centers are open to limited visitors. Additionally, fact sheets and other resources are available at fsa.usda.gov/crp.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest voluntary private-lands conservation programs in the United States. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. The program has evolved over the years, providing many conservation and economic benefits.

A household may submit ads in up to four different categories. Only one ad per category is allowed.

Ads are published in **one issue only**. The person placing the ad is responsible for resubmitting the ad if they would like it to appear again. If you submit your ad online, you will receive a courtesy notice by email asking if you would like to renew.

There is no charge to place an ad.

Ads can be no longer than 150 characters including name, county, and phone number.

Items for sale **must** include a price.

HOW TO SUBMIT ADS

No matter the submission method, submissions must include the advertiser's name, complete address with zip code and county, and phone number with area code. While we don't publish the address, we need this information for our records.

Do not use all capital letters.

- Online: Go to agriculture.sc.gov/market-bulletin. Select "Submit Market Bulletin Ad" and complete the form. If you include your email address, you will receive an automated reminder for a renewal.

HOW TO RENEW ADS

You can renew ads by phone, provided there are no changes to the ad, by calling 803-734-2536. If there are any changes to the ad, you must resubmit it using one of the methods outlined above.

DEADLINES

The deadline for submitting or renewing ads and notices is usually noon on Tuesday of the week before the publication date. Ad deadlines may occasionally be shifted to accommodate state holidays. SPECIFIC CATEGORY RULES

EQUINE

The seller must provide a copy of a current negative Coggins test with the ad. Scanned copies are acceptable.

FARM EQUIPMENT

Ads may not be submitted by commercial dealers. A current farm tag issued by the SCDMV is required on all farm vehicles.

FARM LABOR

Notices are accepted for agricultural work only and not for housework, nursing or companionship needs.

FARM LAND

Farm land must be offered for sale by the owner, not an agent. Tracts must be at least 5 acres under cultivation, timber or pasture. Out-of-state owners—not real estate agents—may submit ads for land in South Carolina.

FRESH PRODUCE

Produce must be raw and non-processed. Raw milk, butter and cheese products must be permitted by the SC Department of Health and Environmental Control. An egg license is not required for on-farm points of sale.

GARDEN PLANTS & FLOWERS

Ads are not accepted from commercial nurseries, which are defined as having annual sales of \$5,000 or more.

SEEDS

All seed advertisements must be accompanied by a copy of a Seed Lab Test.

WANT - LIVESTOCK

Each ad must list specific animals.

SUBSCRIPTION INFORMATION

Print subscription - \$15 per year / \$30 for two years. A paper copy of Market Bulletin is mailed to the subscriber.

Electronic subscription - \$10 per year / \$20 for two years. Subscriber has access to a PDF copy of Market Bulletin via the website, with a new privacy code sent via email for each new issue. An active email address is required.

Print + Electronic - \$20 per year / \$40 for two years.

We cannot accept subscriptions or renewals for periods greater than two years.

CLEMSON EXTENSION COURSE OFFERS TRIP AROUND SC ... WITHOUT LEAVING HOME

ONLINE COURSE ALLOWS PARTICIPANTS TO COMPLETE IT ON THEIR OWN SCHEDULE

CLEMSON, SC — Mountains to sea, South Carolina is many diverse ecosystems wrapped into one small package, and Clemson Cooperative Extension is offering a guided tour of them all — virtually — in an online course starting March 1.

Titled “A SC Natural History Primer,” the online course allows participants to complete it on their own schedule. Registration, and more information, is available at clemson.edu/extension/mn/scnathistprimer.html.

Naturalist Austin Jenkins, who has taught for a decade with Extension’s SC Master Naturalist Program, said the course takes students through the formation of South Carolina and then connects that geology to its flora and fauna, plants and animals.

“Even before that, we talk about the natural history of South Carolina, how it relates to science, some of the early naturalists and early explorers of our state who were unpacking the plants and animals and geology that was here,” Jenkins said. “Then we really get into the state of South Carolina — why do we have the mountains, why do we have the piedmont, the sandhills, the coastal plain and coastal zone. This really diverse package of ecosystems within one small state is pretty substantial.”

The course is taught in cohorts so students may interact through online discussion boards. As part of local geological investigations, students will discuss and travel — again, virtually — to a Carolina bay to uncover the various hypotheses surrounding its odd and picturesque features.

The SC Master Naturalist Program provides nature-based education that aims to inspire citizen volunteers to promote environmental stewardship within their communities through field courses. The online Primer, meanwhile, is an investigation into basic principles of nature that can serve as either a precursor or a follow-up to the knowledge from the program.

But SC Master Naturalist Program State Director James Blake said participants do not need to be part of the Master Naturalist program to take this course, which came about during early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic.

“During the craziness of COVID, with Extension shutting down offices and closing face-to-face programs, we canceled nine, full, 12-week Master Naturalist courses and 32 advanced trainings that we had scheduled,” Blake said. “So, this was a way to get something out there. This does not replace the Master Naturalist Program whatsoever; we still believe in a place-based, nature-learning experience that you just can’t get over a computer.”

This course, however, is a way Extension is connecting people with nature when circumstances wouldn’t allow for in-person participation.

“Even outside of COVID, a lot of our Master Naturalists are retirees who sometimes have health issues they must deal with, so this could be a way that they can engage with nature without feeling like they have to go hiking through Table Rock State Park with us,” Jenkins said. “So, it was trying to provide a connection to nature for people during a time when it was difficult to connect face-to-face.”

The course is divided into four sections and comprised of 36 video lectures, each roughly 30 minutes in length, intended to introduce students to nature with special references to South Carolina.

In addition to understanding the basic principles, concepts and language of natural history through the exploration of the state’s flora, fauna and geology, participants will work to appreciate South Carolina’s biodiversity at multiple scales, from ecoregion to species.

Upon successful completion, students will be able to understand the scientific method, classify South Carolina’s organisms into basic biological groups, explain its geological formations within the context of ecosystem development and more.

“Throughout all this there’s an underlying thread of how we are connected to the natural world, and I think what people come to understand is that it’s sort of an extension of who we are,” Jenkins said. “It’s a lot like anything: the better you get to know yourself, the better-off you are in life. So, when nature is just an extension of us, we kind of get to know more about ourselves through this course — and we feel more at home in the state that maybe we’ve lived in all our lifetime or just settled in recently.”

Applicants should propose projects that provide one or more of the following benefits:

- Enhanced food safety
- Improved capacity of all entities in the specialty crop distribution chain to comply with the requirements of the Food Safety Modernization Act, Investment in specialty crop research, including research to focus on conservation and environmental outcomes
- Development of new and improved seed varieties and specialty crops
- Enhanced pest and disease control
- Increased child and adult nutrition knowledge and consumption of specialty crops
- Increased efficiency and reduced costs of distribution systems
- Enhanced sustainability

Proposed projects must fall within the criteria as described in the application.
