## L B WANNAMAKER SEED **CLOSES OUT 86-YEAR HISTORY**

Luther B. Wannamaker Jr. once worked as an ad and speech writer for an insurance company. Now, he's known as a seed man. For the past 57 years, Luther has sold a variety of seeds through the L B Wannamaker Seed Co. After a long career marked by three evolutions, Luther Wannamaker recently decided to retire.

In 1966, Luther moved back home to St. Matthews, SC to work for the family company. Without a background in the seed industry, he learned how to breed soybeans,

planting thousands of rows by hand. Using the knowledge gained from his attempts at soybean breeding, Luther was able to evaluate and sell new varieties from other South Carolina breeders in southern Alabama.

In the 1970s, economic hardship hit many small seed companies including Wannamaker. Seeking a new revenue stream, Luther journeyed to Japan where he learned to grow black soybeans and Natto soybeans, both of which are edible varieties. Wannamaker Seed grew and sold these varieties to Japan for nearly 20 years until eventually the Japanese buyers found other less expensive producers and the L B Wannamaker seed company had to reinvent itself once again.

Luther became interested in a variety of grain called naked oats after noticing their relatively high protein content. Howard Harrison of Coker Pedigreed Seed Co. had brought naked oats from Germany and adapted them to the southern climate but needed help to market them. Luther jumped at the opportunity. Around the same time, he met Bobby McDonald, the son of a horse jockey. They decided that they would market naked oats as the feed of choice for thoroughbred horses.



Even at 93, Luther remains busy. In retirement, Luther is pursuing his interest in the



American Revolution. He has recently dedicated his time to the stewardship of a piece of land purchased by his grandfather on the Fort Motte Battle Site and has commissioned a biography of Rebecca Brewton Motte.

In February, Luther and his wife Doraine held a farewell luncheon for friends, family, and customers of the Wannamaker Seed Company They brought people from throughout the seed company's history to personally thank them and bid farewell. While Luther will no longer offer seed, he remains available for consultation regarding seed sourcing and wildlife planting.

## **AN EMERGING** MARKET

n March, I had the opportunity to lead a trade delegation to Thailand on behalf of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture (NASDA).

As part of the Emerging Markets Program, four of us agriculture leaders from around the country, along with NASDA staff, traveled to Thailand to meet with government officials and business leaders. The focus of the trip was how we can increase trade between our two countries - and my focus, as ever, was how to create more opportunities for South Carolina farmers.

Thailand is a country of more than 71 million people. The biggest opportunity I saw for American farmers is Thailand's need for animal feed. They raise and process a lot of pork, tariffs, speaking to political leaders, removing barriers — to improve opportunities for trade.

One of our goals was to help Thai ag leaders understand that the US is not a monolith. A state like North Dakota is very different from South Carolina in terms of port access, seasons, and what it grows.

We also discussed topics like sustainability, food safety, and ingredient quality.

I also got the opportunity to see a little of the country. We took a river cruise near Bangkok and saw some temples.

It was quite a month for international relations, as once I got back to South Carolina, I hosted some visitors from Vietnam. We took Ambassador Nguyen Quoc Dzung and members of the Vietnam Embassy to **Coosaw Farms and Sharp** & Sharp Certified Seed, where they took tours and discussed sustainable agriculture. Vietnam is another emerging market and important trade opportunity for South Carolina farmers.

In the early 2000s, after discovering that deer and wild turkeys would eat naked oats, Wannamaker began selling them as wildlife feed. Luther then realized that the Natto soybeans he grew for years also made for good deer food. He mixed the

While there is no planned successor to the seed company, Luther leaves behind a legacy of adaptability and agribusiness acumen.

poultry, and seafood, and they don't have sufficient domestic sources of feed ingredients. Of course, there are lots of other countries competing to sell feed to countries like Thailand.

We do not have a free trade agreement with Thailand. When the **United States pulled** out of the Trans Pacific Partnership, our trade relationship with Thailand was affected, and there's some work to be done discussing existing

Most recently, I was in Washington DC to speak to our South Carolina delegation about the Farm Bill. Progress is being made. And now, I'm happy to be back in my home state once again.

### **Strawberry Mini Muffins**

- 2 cups fresh strawberries, sliced or diced
- 3 cups all purpose flour
- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups white sugar
- I Tbsp ground cinnamon • I tsp salt
- I tsp baking soda
- I cup vegetable oil

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Butter and flour the mini-muffin tins (four or five tins for 48 muffins). Slice strawberries, and place in a large bowl. Sprinkle lightly with some of the pre-measured sugar and set aside. Combine flour, sugar, cinnamon, salt, and baking soda in a large bowl. Pour the oil and eggs into the strawberries and stir to coat. Add the strawberry mixture to the dry ingredients and blend until dry ingredients are just moistened. Divide batter into pans, using a small spoon. Fill each indentation in the muffin tins <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of the way full. Bake for 15-20 minutes or until an inserted knife comes out clean. Let cool in pans on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Turn the muffins out and eat warm or leave to cool.

### **Fresh Strawberry Syrup**

Recipe by Will Green.

Capture the essence of fresh strawberry flavor. Excellent on pancakes, French toast, or ice cream; and a spoonful or two mixed into cold sparkling water will produce a lovely strawberry soda. An immersion blender will make this task easier, but a jar blender will work fine.

- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lb ripe South Carolina strawberries, hulled and sliced thin
- $I^{\frac{1}{2}}$  cups white sugar
- Juice of one lemon
- Pinch of salt
- 4 cups water

Combine the water, salt, and sugar in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil, then back down to a bare simmer. Stir to dissolve sugar and salt. Add I lb of strawberries (reserve <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lb of the very ripest berries) and simmer gently for 10 minutes. Remove from heat, add lemon juice and reserved berries. Blend for I minute. Pour resulting liquid through your finest sieve and into a large bowl. You will need to stir and press the liquid through the sieve to extract maximum flavor and yield. You may need to work in 2-3 batches, emptying the sieve each time. Jar the syrup. Will keep in fridge for a week.



## How to Keep **Strawberries**

#### IN THE REFRIGERATOR

Cooking website The Kitchn tested a variety of ways to keep strawberries fresh, finding most success with dunking the berries in a water bath made with 1 part white vinegar and 3 parts water, then draining them and drying them as thoroughly as possible using a salad spinner. If that sounds too involved, simply rinsing the berries and then thoroughly drying them in a salad spinner before putting them in the refrigerator also got decent results. The next best method was simply storing the berries, unwashed, in a clamshell or other container with air circulation. The best method, of course, is to try to use them as quickly as you can.

- Mash strawberries in a bowl and set aside. In • 4 eggs, lightly beaten large mixing bowl of stand-mixer or in a large bowl and using an electric hand mixer, add all the ingredients: heavy whipping cream, sweetened condensed milk. Whip the heavy cream mixture on high speed until stiff peaks form (to prevent massive splattering, start out at a slower speed and as the cream thickens, increase the speed).

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a 9-inch square baking pan with parchment paper with long edges. This will help you lift out the blondies for easy glazing and icing. Cream together butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in the egg until fully incorporated. Add lemon juice. Whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt. Add to wet ingredients mixing until no more dry flour is present. Gently fold in strawberries. Spread the mixture into your pan as evenly as possible. The dough will be thick. Bake for 30-35 minutes, just until starting to turn golden around the edges and the center is set. A toothpick inserted in the center will be moist but not west. Let cool on rack. Trim the 2 strawberries for glaze and puree in small food processor or mash through a strainer to get about I Tbsp of puree. Whisk together the sugar, Tbsp of strawberry puree, and lemon juice until no lumps remain. If your glaze is too think, add more sugar. If it's too thick add more lemon juice. Spread the glaze over the cooled blondies. Let the glaze set before slicing.

#### IN THE FREEZER

Strawberries freeze well. Wash and hull them, then spread on a cookie sheet to freeze. Store in plastic freezer bags. Those of us with fridges too narrow for a cookie sheet can find decent results with just rinsing, hulling, and drying the berries off as much as possible before tossing them in a plastic freezer bag.

## **DISPOSE OF WASTE PESTICIDES AT EVENTS THROUGHOUT** SOUTH CAROLINA

#### BY SCDA

COLUMBIA — The South Carolina Department of Agriculture (SCDA) is offering South Carolina residents the opportunity to safely dispose of outdated, unusable or unwanted pesticides.

The pesticide and chemical program is open to all private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators in the state, as well as homeowners. SCDA staff will be on site to monitor pesticide collection and disposal, and will have final authority on acceptance of products.

Additional details include:

- Quantities will be limited to 2500 pounds of solid and 300 gallons of liquid at no charge.
- Acceptable products include herbicides, insecticides, nematicides, fungicides and similar products used in agriculture production or around the home.
- Prohibited items include empty pesticide containers, rinsate, infectious, biological or radioactive materials, explosives, appliances, paint and compressed gas cylinders (metal cylinder with a valve).
- A hazardous material company will be on site to properly dispose of the materials collected.
- Materials should be transported to the collection event in sturdy boxes with newspaper stuffed between the containers to prevent spills.
- Leave items in the original containers.

## USDA ANNOUNCES \$29 MILLION TO INCREASE AMERICAN-MADE FERTILIZER PRODUCTION

FIRST ROUND OF AWARDS WILL SPUR COMPETITION AND GIVE U.S. FARMERS MORE CHOICES AND FAIRER PRICES

ORLANDO, Fla., March 10, 2023 – U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that the Department received \$3 billion in applications from more than 350 independent businesses from 47 states and 2 territories for the first two rounds of a new grant program to add innovative domestic fertilizer production capacity.

USDA also announced the first \$29 million in grant offers under the first round that focused on projects that can come online in the near term. The grants will help independent businesses increase production of American-made fertilizer, which will spur competition, give U.S. farmers more choices and fairer prices and reduce dependence on unreliable foreign sources like Russia and Belarus. Vilsack made the announcement at the 2023 Commodity Classic, the same event where he first unveiled the program a year earlier.

"I know that increased costs for fertilizer and other inputs have put a strain on farmers and cut into the bottom line. The Biden-Harris Administration and USDA understand the importance of taking on the root causes and need to invest in the agricultural supply chain here at home to create a resilient, secure and sustainable economy for the long haul," Vilsack said. "By expanding the production of domestic fertilizer supplies, we can grow independent local businesses, bring production and jobs to rural communities and support fair prices for our farmers."

The Biden-Harris Administration's Fertilizer Production Expansion Program is part of a government-wide effort to promote competition in agricultural markets. The program supports fertilizer production that is independent, made-in-America, innovative, sustainable and farmerfocused.

#### STRONG DEMAND

Vilsack made the initial announcement to dedicate \$250 million at the 2022 Commodity Classic, the same event where he is making the first awards a year later. From the start, it has been clear there is strong demand for the program and even before applications were being taken, President Biden directed USDA to increase the program to \$500 million at a farm visit in Illinois in May 2022. This fall, demand for the program was immediately evident by the sheer number, range and diversity of applications. More than 350 applications came in from applicants of every size and business model, including cooperatives, Tribal communities, female-owned companies and public bodies. These applicants requested between \$1 million and \$100

million for projects across 47 states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

In all, \$3 billion in funding was requested for projects that could increase production immediately for Crop Years 2023 and 2024, as well as bolster long-term availability of U.S.-produced fertilizer. Projects were proposed for both fertilizers and nutrient alternatives, and represented different technologies, including composters, complex manufacturing, farm supply blenders and distributors.

In addition to increasing the supply of domestic fertilizer, the projects propose the creation or saving of hundreds of jobs, often in regions where they are most needed, including energy communities and those experiencing generational poverty. Additional details on the second round of applications will be released in the coming weeks as the reviews are completed.

#### FIRST AWARD OFFERS

The first round of FPEP was focused on projects that could increase fertilizer capacity for the 2023 or the 2024 crop year, to prioritize projects with near-term impact. In January, a list of 21 potentially viable projects from the first round was released with a request for public comment. The \$29 million announced by Secretary Vilsack will be offered to eight independent businesses in Alabama, Colorado, Massachusetts, Missouri, Ohio and Washington. The grants will help businesses modernize equipment, advance climate-smart practices and build production plants, among other activities.

For example:

- In Sylacauga, Alabama, Pursell Agri-Tech LLC, a manufacturer of controlled-release fertilizer (CRF), is being offered \$4.9 million to assist with working capital that will increase its inventory by 40,000 tons per year. Each ton of CRF effectively doubles the nutrient benefit of a ton of fertilizer, making this 40,000 ton increase of CRF equivalent to 80,000 tons of uncoated fertilizer per year. These funds could be put to use beginning in spring 2023 with farmers realizing the benefit of increased fertilizer availability almost immediately.
- In Unionville, Missouri, Palindromes Inc. is being offered \$4.9 million to expand the use of anaerobic digestion and renewable energy to produce process and cell climate smart fortilizer

food waste into dried organic fertilizers and soil amendments.

• In Othello, Washington, Perfect Blend LLC is being offered \$2.6 million to assist with expanding and increasing its ability to manufacture and process raw manure and fish waste into fertilizer by using its patented technology. This project will replace a stainlesssteel dryer drum and construct a liquid fertilizer blending station and storage area on its facility.

### BACKGROUND

USDA began accepting applications for FPEP in September 2022. The Department initially announced plans to make \$250 million in grants available but quickly doubled the available funding to \$500 million to address rising costs and spur competition.

Fertilizer prices more than doubled between 2021 and 2022 due to many factors, including price hikes caused by the war in Ukraine, a limited supply of the relevant minerals, high energy costs, high global demand and agricultural commodity prices, reliance on imports, and a lack of competition in the fertilizer industry.

## CLEMSON AWARDED USDA GRANT TO STUDY SALINE-WATER IRRIGATION TO GROW SALT-TOLERANT CROPS

A limited amount of freshwater threatens agriculture production and food security, but researchers believe some crops can be grown sustainably in saline water if proper techniques are used. with effective management of water, nutrients and fertilizers, as well as salinity, we believe we can grow salt-tolerant crops sustainably according to both economic and environmental metrics," The study will be conducted in vegetable growing areas of South Carolina and Florida and will be extended to Arizona. Objectives of the 5-year research, education and Extension project, which

The researchers are from Clemson University, the University of Florida and the United States Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service. Led by Clemson professor Raghupathy Karthikeyan, the research team has received a \$10 million grant from the United States Department of Agriculture National Institute of Food and Agriculture (USDA NIFA) to study development of a controlled environment agriculture (CEA) platform for growing salt-tolerant crops - mustard greens, cucumbers and

tomatoes – using saline water for irrigation.

"In many freshwater-scarce regions, saline water sources such as brackish groundwater are available and can be used for irrigation," said Karthikeyan, Newman Endowed Chair Professor of Natural Resources Engineering and project director. "However, increased soil and land salinization restricts use of these water sources in traditional open field cultivation, a problem that can be reduced by using hydroponic (soilless) cultivation in CEA. Several high-value food crops are salt sensitive but can be made more salt tolerant through breeding."

CEA covers a variety of systems, including greenhouses and modular containers, that take a technology-based approach to farming. These systems are designed to provide optimal growing conditions for crops and prevent disease and pest damage. Hydroponic agriculture is using a water-based nutrient solution rather than soil to grow plants.

"By using desalination techniques that are appropriate to the agricultural sector coupled



tension project, which begins on April I, include developing a hydroponic CEA platform, using saline waters for irrigation, managing salinity to better align with crop responses as the crops become acclimated to high salinity and selecting mustard greens, cucumber and tomato varieties for enhanced salt tolerance.

This grant is part of a \$70 million dollar investment from the USDA to establish robust, resilient, and climate-smart food and agricultural systems.

In addition to Karthikeyan and Amy, other Clemson

researchers include Jeff Adelberg, Sandra Branham, David Ladner and Michael Carbajales-Dale. These researchers provide expertise in horticulture, plant breeding, water science and technology, and life cycle assessment. Dale Layfield and Kenneth Robinson will lead education and Cooperative Extension Service activities.

Researchers from the University of Florida are Melanie Correll, Elias Bassil, Ray Huffaker and Haimanote Bayabil. Rama Radhakrishna is a researcher from Purdue University. C.S. Kousik, Kai-Shu Ling, and Clinton Williams from the United States Department of Agriculture Agricultural Research Service also are involved.

Information from the United States Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service shows agriculture accounts for much of the total freshwater consumption in the United States. Irrigated crop production helps support local rural economies and contributes to the nation's livestock, food processing, transportation and energy sectors.

said Gary Amy, dean distinguished professor in the Clemson Department of Environmental Engineering and Earth Sciences. "We are advocating partial desalination technologies to produce tailored-quality irrigation water to match the salt tolerance of a target crop."

The overall goal is to develop a hydroponics CEA platform for cultivating salt-tolerant food crops using saline irrigation water while ensuring no environmental impacts associated with salinity are created.

"We will do this by enhancing crop salt tolerance through breeding, developing new concepts in agricultural desalting technologies and optimizing salinity management," Karthikeyan said.

Knowledge gained from this study will help growers use marginal quality water for year-round production.

Controlled environment agriculture has a market value of more than \$70 billion. This amount is expected to increase as CEA use increases.

## **NEW REPORT REVEALS GROWING FOOTPRINT, INFLUENCE OF FOOD** & AG SECTOR IN U.S. ECONOMY, BEATING PRE-PANDEMIC LEVELS

FEEDING THE ECONOMY REVEALS NEW DATA ON JOBS, WAGES, AND ECONOMIC OUTPUT AT DISTRICT, STATE, AND NATIONWIDE LEVELS

On March 21, 25 food and agriculture groups released the seventh annual Feeding the Economy report, revealing food and agriculture industries and their suppliers contribute over \$8.6 trillion to the U.S. economy, nearly one-fifth of total national output and a 22% increase since the 2019 report. Providing data on jobs, wages, and economic output, this farm-to-fork analysis illustrates the food and agriculture sector's impact on local and nationwide economic activity. The data also underscores this sector's resilience and reliability amid unprecedented global and domestic crises, including the commodity shock following the war in Ukraine and continued supply chain disruptions.

This year's report shows the U.S. food and agriculture sector directly supports nearly 23 million jobs, provides \$927 billion in wages, and is particularly vital to rural communities across America. Notably, the 2023 report reveals that the manufacturing of agricultural products accounts for nearly one-fifth of total manufacturing jobs in the U.S. Overall, more than 46 million jobs are supported across the food and agriculture supply chain, increasing nearly 2% since the 2019 report despite the economic challenges and disruptions associated with the global pandemic.

All 50 states displayed increased economic output in the 2023 report compared to the 2022 report, largely reflecting a rebound in national economic activity. The largest gains in total output were from Hawaii (31%), North Dakota (26%), New York (23%), Nevada (22%), and Florida (21%).

Key findings from national data include:

• Total Jobs: 46,283,917 (up 1.5% since the 2019 report)

• Total Wages: \$2.61 trillion (up 26.2% since the 2019 report)

- Total Taxes: \$947.93 billion (up 3.8% since the 2019 report)
- Exports: \$202.2 billion (up 24.4% since the 2019 report)
- Total Food and Ag Industry Economic Impact: \$8.6 trillion (up 21.8% since the 2019 report)

Some highlights from South Carolina are:

- Job: 655,728
- Taxes: \$10.5 billion
- Wages: \$28.9 billion • Exports: \$1.1 billion

The strength and growth highlighted in this year's report reinforce that agriculture is evolving and innovating to meet the demands of the 21st century. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, between 1948 and 2019, land use for agriculture decreased by 28% while land productivity grew nearly four times and labor productivity grew more than 10 times. In fact, agriculture's total factor productivity growth rate is among the highest of U.S. sectors.

"Agriculture is foundational to the U.S. economy, reaching far beyond the farm gate, supporting over 46 million jobs. In manufacturing, more than twice as many Americans are manufacturing agricultural products as cars and trucks," said Corn Refiners Association President and CEO John Bode. "The resilience of the food and agriculture sector is clear - all 50 states increased economic output in the 2023 report."

"This study highlights the impact the greater food and ag sector industries have on the American economy and the sector's critical role in providing economic opportunity, nutritional value, and safe food for all Americans," said American Bakers Association President and CEO Eric Dell.

"The Feeding the Economy report has focused on the jobs and economic activity created across the food value chain - from crop inputs to the services that it takes to put food on the table. Today, in the face of supply chain disruptions and the Ukraine Conflict, we truly need to think about the urgent need to feed people in addition to the important role that agriculture plays in our economy," added CropLife America President and CEO Chris Novak.
