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PARTNERSHIP HELPS SMALL FARMERS IN SC **ACHIEVE KEY FOOD SAFETY CERTIFICATION**

WITH DUKE ENERGY DONATION, PROGRAM IS 'CLOSING THE GAP' FOR FARMERS

COLUMBIA — A new partnership is helping more South Carolina farmers show buyers their commitment to food safety.

The South Carolina Department of Agriculture's Agribusiness Center for Research and Entrepreneurship (ACRE) is helping South Carolina farmers achieve Good Agricultural Practices certification thanks to a \$100,000 grant from Duke Energy.

Good Agricultural Practices, or GAP, is a voluntary federal audit showing that a farm is taking significant steps to reduce the risk of foodborne illness associated with fresh fruits and vegetables. Some buyers, including some grocery chains and school districts, will only purchase from GAP-certified farms. Thus, GAP certification can be crucial for farms looking to scale up their operations and find sustainable markets for their produce.

"We know many small South Carolina farms are already using excellent food safety practices, and GAP certification is a stamp of approval so buyers know it, too," said Commissioner of Agriculture Hugh Weathers. "I thank all our partners in this effort for their commitment to sustaining South Carolina agriculture."

"GAP certification means opportunity and access for small, social disadvantaged farmers," said Larry Harris, a produce grower who owns Harris Farms LLC in Sumter County. Harris has also worked to bring other farmers in to the program.

"Agribusiness is South Carolina's top industry, and Duke Energy is proud to power thousands of family and commercial farms and related businesses," said Mike Callahan, Duke Energy's South Carolina president. "We are excited to invest in resources like the GAP certification program that will help farmers grow their business and support our agricultural economy."

A LOOK AT THE 2024 SC ECONOMY

n December, economists at the University of South Carolina's Moore School of Business rolled out their predictions for the year to come. Basically, there's some bad news and some good news.

The bad news comes in several parts. First, inflation is still going to be an issue. Higher interest rates have helped to slow down inflation, though those higher rates have their own consequences. Prices are still going up, though at a slower rate than earlier in 2023. I know I felt those prices as I shopped for Christmas presents.

More bad news: Labor shortages remain a real problem. That's the case in agriculture and every other sector of the economy. It's great to have unemployment around 3%, until you're looking to hire folks.

The good news is that South Carolina's economy will continue to grow next year, and agribusiness is a big part of that. In this issue of Market Bulletin, you can read about several South Carolina agribusiness success stories, from Luray Peanut Co. to the new beef processor in Laurens County.

I also want to give you an update on ChangeSC, a project near to my heart.

More than 80% of South Carolina's counties have food deserts, areas where residents have limited access to fresh, healthy food. ChangeSC is our effort to bring fresh, nutritious food directly to the doorsteps of these communities and teach people how to prepare it.

For our initial efforts, SCDA partnered with Pick 42 Foundation and DHEC to give out bags of local produce (collard greens, sweet potatoes, mustard greens, turnips, bok choy, cabbage, broccoli, and pecans, plus chicken, beef, and eggs when available) and recipe cards in four counties: Marlboro, Dillon, Marion, and Williamsburg. Since the launch in early November, ChangeSC has provided nearly 6,500 bags of locally grown produce to families in the pilot area, and purchased from more than 30 South Carolina farmers. You can learn more at ChangeSC.com.

ACRE is partnering with the Carolina Farm Stewardship Association, the South Carolina Black Farmers Coalition, Pick 42 Foundation, and Bonita Global LLC to help growers prepare for a GAP audit and cover the costs of certification. The program is targeting small, minorityowned farms in South Carolina.

Half of Duke Energy's generous contribution is being used for the GAP assistance program, while ACRE is using the other \$50,000 for small business development grants to agricultural producers in the region served by Duke Energy.

Are you a farmer interested in GAP certification? Visit agriculture.sc.gov/gap to learn about how to prepare for an audit through workshops and/or on-farm consultations, what reimbursement funding is available through SCDA, and more.

A final piece of tough news: There's still lots of uncertainty ahead. Joey Von Nessen, research economist in the Moore School's Division of Research, put it this way: "Higher interest rates have slowed demand in 2023 and are putting the brakes on inflation and an overheated economy, but there is still a chance that this slowdown continues for too long and could lead to a recession next year." I respect Dr. Von Nessen tremendously, but I hope he's overstating the recession possibility.

Here's to a happy and prosperous 2024!

NEW FLOOD EVACUATION TOOL HELPS WITH PREPAREDNESS, **EVACUATION AND RESPONSE**



With eight major river basins, South Carolina is prone to catastrophic floods. Flooded roads and homes have become a familiar sight in many parts of the state.

Research shows these flood events are expected to occur more frequently and likely will intensify

in the future. During flooding events, stakeholders must both balance the demands these events impose on decision-making processes and attend to the service delivery infrastructure of affected communities. Four Clemson University researchers are part of a national team that has developed a Flood Evacuation Tool to help forecast floods, identify at-risk roads and verify safe evacuation routes.

The tool partners artificial intelligence (AI) with human knowledge. Researchers

Pamela Murray-Tuite, director of the Clemson

are using this human-AI teaming (HAT) partnership to create an intelligent model for addressing flood evacuation decisions in isolated South Carolina rural coastal communities. Current flood evacuation models include Geographic Information System (GIS) and infrastructure planning approaches, which do not use artificial intelligence.

"Supporting humans and AI machines as teammates in flood evacuation decisions relies on a carefully designed system with the capability for monitoring, analyzing, responding and executing," said Vidya Samadi, Department of Agricultural Sciences assistant professor and Clemson Hydrosystem and Hydroinformatics Research Group director. "The goal of our research is to achieve a trusting partnership between humans and AI machines by designing a flood evacuation system that combines AI, geospatial data and river hydraulic parameters to forecast floods, identify at-risk roads and generate evacuation rerouting plans." University Institute for Sustainable Education and a civil engineering professor, used her knowledge of evacuation modeling in the design.

"This tool could help identify areas at risk of flooding that would need evacuation and areas that are potentially hazardous during an evacuation," Murray-Tuite said.

Data from the United States Geological Survey's National Water Data Portal and the National Weather Service Forecast, as well as social media data, are being used to evaluate and forecast road flooding to provide rerouting recommendations.

Nina Hubig, an assistant professor with the Clemson School of Computing, is using her Al and data science knowledge for the project. In addition, Rishav Karanjit, a Clemson graduate student from the School of Computing, is helping the team with workflow implementation and design.

The tool should help improve decision-making at all levels.

"For the emergency management community, this is another tool in the toolbox to be able to combat flooding," Rochester said. "Planning is a part of emergency management to have an effective response. I see this tool as being able to support that."

In addition to Clemson scientists, other researchers involved in this study include Keri K. Stephens, a professor in organizational communication technology, as well as a distinguished teaching professor and co-director of the Technology and Information Policy Institute in the Moody College of Communication at The University of Texas at Austin, and Amanda Hughes, an associate professor of computer science at Brigham Young University.

This project received a 2023 Technical Merit Award from the American Society of Civil Engineers. It is funded by the National Science Foundation.

SC STATE SENIOR RELISHES INTERACTION WITH US SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE ON CAMPUS

ORANGEBURG, S.C. — As a senior agribusiness major at South Carolina State University, Kailyn B. Wrighten knows a good career opportunity when it comes knocking.

On Thursday, she had the privilege of introducing U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack at an on-campus summit with government, agriculture industry, and university leaders, as well as growers, farmers, and ranchers. That privilege meant her

hard work as one of SC State 1890 Research & Extension's USDA National Ag Innovation Scholars had not gone unnoticed.

"I'm just a girl from a small town," Wrighten said. "So, to be making great strides as a senior at South Carolina State shows me that my work ethic is strong and that I've had a great village to help me with my upbringing."

That small town is St.

Stephens, South Carolina, where Wrighten's family connection to agriculture led to her interest in agribusiness. At Thursday's summit in a panel discussion, she heard growers, farmers and ranchers tell Vilsack about the challenges they face in the realm of agriculture.

"It was relatable," Wrighten said. "My grandfather was a small-operation, row-crop farmer, so to hear this diverse panel—it shows that agriculture is an ever-growing and diverse industry despite that there also are real issues.

"For farmers—large farmers and small farmers in the state of South Carolina to get those issues addressed by the head of our United States Department of Agriculture was really important," she said. "I'm grateful those farmers had the opportunity. I'm grateful to see that that platform was elevated here in Orangeburg at South Carolina State University."

Joining Vilsack in the summit were two federal officials: Stephen Benjamin, senior advisor and director of the White House Office of Public Engagement and former mayor of Columbia, and Dr. Dewayne Goldmon, the secretary's senior advisor for racial equity. The state of South Carolina was represented by Commissioner of Agriculture Hugh Weathers.

"I thank Secretary Vilsack, Mayor Benjamin, Dr. Goldman and Commissioner Weathers for taking the time to meet with our stakeholders, especially our students, here on our campus," SC State President Alexander Conyers said. "The gathering's focus was on ensuring that South Carolina's growers, farmers and ranchers have access to federal and state resources that help them build success, while giving our students insight into the complexities of the industry. farmers and ranchers via the Inflation Reduction Act and other federal programs. He said President Joe Biden gave him specific instructions about what the USDA should accomplish, the first of which was to make sure the department worked for "all people regardless of zip code or circumstance."

He noted that since 1981, the U.S. has lost about 437,300 farms—one out of every six farms in the country—and 141.1 million acres once devoted to agricultural purposes.

> "Are we OK with that? Do we think that's a good direction for the country?" he asked. "Well, if we're not, then the question is well, what do we do about it?"

He also noted that while 2022 was the best year on record for agriculture-related revenue, 89% of that income went to just 7.5 percent of farmers—large operations with sales over \$500,000. The

"SC State is a pipeline for small and midsize agriculture operations to find sustainable solutions to their needs, and our Public Service & Agriculture division under the dynamic leadership of Dr. Louis Whitesides is working diligently to bring the proper resources, expertise and training to the table," Conyers said.

Before the panel discussion in the SC State Fine Arts Building's Barbara A. Vaughan Recital Hall, Vilsack met with Conyers, Whitesides and other university leaders to learn about the various projects and programs SC State 1890 Public Service & Agriculture has either established or hopes to establish with the support of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Those included USDA grant-funded Climate Smart initiatives with current and future agriculture professionals.

"This is an amazing HBCU that's doing remarkable work," Vilsack told the crowd ahead of the panel discussion. "I have been so impressed with the level of partnerships the university has been able to establish, not just with USDA, but with a number of other entities to expand opportunity."

Vilsack's presentation outlined both the challenges and the opportunities in the agriculture industry, specifically addressing Biden Administration initiatives to aid small and minority growers, remaining 92.5%—roughly 2 million farms had to split the rest, which he said explains why nearly half of all farms did not make money.

Using a whiteboard, he outlined several initiatives underway to address those inequities—a new framework for small and midsize farms—including climate-smart projects. He noted that SC State is the only university in the country with two projects focused on that effort:

- The first of those is a \$70M USDA investment into a partnership between Clemson and SC State to provide incentives to farmers in South Carolina to implement selected climate-smart production practices.
- The second is a \$4.5 million USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service grant that will facilitate a partnership between SC State 1890 Research & Extension, Mixon Seed and the South Carolina Black Farmer Coalition for climatesmart initiatives. The funding will be used to educate and train South Carolina's small and minority farmers and producers in climate-smart practices.

Following Vilsack's presentation and panel discussion, the secretary met with Wrighten and other members of SC State's USDA National Ag Innovation Scholars cohort.
