South Carolina Department of Agriculture

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New data about agriculture in South Carolina show strong production values, but may raise concerns about loss of farms.

The US Department of Agriculture's National **Agricultural Statistics** Service (NASS) released data from the 2022 Census of Agriculture on February 13, 2024. The highly anticipated

release covers more than 6 million data points and is used to inform everything from disaster response funding to rural policy to crop research. The Census of Agriculture was first performed in 1840, and is currently carried out every five years.

Some key findings for South Carolina are:

SC HAS FEWER FARMS

The number of farms in South Carolina dropped by 8.7 percent, from 24,791 to 22,633. Small farms (1-9 acres and 10-49 acres) account for the biggest losses.

Farmland fell from 4.7 million to 4.6 million acres.

Farm value per acre (land and buildings) is up 21.9 percent statewide.

PRODUCTION VALUE, NET INCOME UP

South Carolina farms produced \$4.4 billion in agricultural products in 2022, up from \$3 billion in 2017.





or 7.8 percent of all producers.

SC FARMER DEMOGRAPHICS ARE CHANGING

The number of military veteran farmers in the state dropped. South Carolina producers with military service fell 15 percent to 4,553, with an average age of 67.6. Nationwide, the number of producers fell 18 percent.

Black farmer numbers also fell. South Carolina had 2,501 producers who were Black in 2022, a drop from 2,634 in 2017. Additionally, the average age of a Black farmer in SC is 62.4, older than the average age of any other ethnicity.

Meanwhile, the number of Hispanic farmers was up, from 423 in 2017 to 554 producers in 2022. American Indian producer numbers also grew, from 307 to 355.

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

HUGH E. WEATHERS SOUTH CAROLINA

A VISIT TO CUBA

' n February, I spent four days in Cuba as part of a delegation from the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture (NASDA). It was an eye-opening journey that I hope will bear fruit for South Carolina farmers in the years to come.

As you may know, over the past several years, Cuba has been slowly opening up more to international trade, and relations between the US and Cuba have eased somewhat with regards to food. I traveled there with five other agriculture commissioners, along with USDA Foreign Ag Service officials and NASDA leaders, to learn what opportunities the country holds.

We met with government officials and industry and private sector leaders in Cuba-most notably President Miguel Díaz-Canel, who succeeded Raúl Castro in 2019. We also met with government ministers for Agriculture, Foreign Affairs, and Economy and Planning, along with farmers, food processors, and other businesspeople. Cuba is slowly transitioning from state socialism to a mixed economy where state enterprises work alongside private companies. This shift is motivated in part by the country's high rate of food insecurity. Over the past five years, more than 10,000 businesses have been formed, many of them related to

food and agriculturespecifically, many new agricultural cooperatives. While this was a business trip, I did get the chance to tour Old Havana, and I also enjoyed the fact that our transportation everywhere was in brightly colored vintage American cars imported before the 1962 US embargo. We traveled to an agriculture market, a logistics center and a food cooperative.

Obviously, there are a lot of factors at play when it comes to trade with Cuba, many of them beyond the scope of what I do as agriculture commissioner. There are still embargos in place. This is a long-term process. But I saw some strong potential for future trade relationships.

Poultry producers in the Southeastern US are already trading with Cuba, and I think that will continue to develop as an important market. Peanuts offer strong potential for export to Cuba. And given our status as a peach-producing state, I think that's another area we need to investigate.

Average net farm income rose to \$64,908. 31.8 percent of South Carolina farms had positive net cash farm income in 2022.

POULTRY IS BOOMING

The poultry industry in South Carolina had \$2.5 billion in annual sales, with nearly 3,000 farms in the state participating in the industry. Poultry accounts for 56.6 percent of total sales of SC agricultural products.

FARMERS ARE **GETTING OLDER**

The average age of a South Carolina farmer has risen to 58.9 years from 58.2 years, continuing an upward trajectory.

Total vegetable acreage in the state grew from 30,318 acres in 2017 to 37,811 in 2022.

Cucumber production nearly quadrupled to 3,795 acres. Southern peas also quadrupled to 3,617 acres. Turnip green acreage doubled to 1,980 acres.

The highest acreage vegetable in South Carolina is watermelon, at 4,040 acres.

Berry sales grew from \$13 million in 2017 to \$44.3 million in 2022.

Sod sales nearly doubled, to \$97.5 million.

AQUACULTURE THRIVING

Aquaculture grew fivefold over five years, from \$6.5 million to \$34.6 million in annual sales.

There is also demand in Cuba for rice, corn, wheat, beef, pork, dairy, animal feed, and farm equipment.

In general, I think it's important that the US stays competitive in Cuba. I think there's enormous opportunity there and I look forward to continuing these discussions.

In light of the February 6, 2024, ruling by the U.S. District Court of Arizona vacating the 2020 registrations for over-the-top (OTT) dicamba products, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is providing the following update. On February 14, 2024, EPA issued an Existing Stocks Order for Dicamba Products Previously Registered for Over-the-Top Use on Dicamba-Tolerant Cotton and Soybean. This Order addresses use of the formerly-registered dicamba products and authorizes limited sale and distribution of dicamba products that are already in the possession of growers or in the channels of trade and outside the control of the pesticide companies.

BACKGROUND

Dicamba is an herbicide used to target broadleaf weeds in agricultural and non-agricultural settings. The herbicide is registered for use at specified stages in agricultural crop fields of corn, cotton, sorghum, soybeans, sugarcane, and other crops. The dicamba products subject to the February 2024 vacatur were registered to be sprayed OTT of genetically engineered dicamba-tolerant soybeans and cotton after the crops have emerged from the ground. There are also dicamba products that are only registered for non-OTT applications. These products are applied earlier in the growing season before crop emergence while OTT products can be applied later in the growing season after crop emergence.

issued an order for the affected products that addressed existing stocks.

In October 2020, EPA issued new registrations for two dicamba products and extended the registration of an additional dicamba product until 2025. All three registrations included new measures that the Agency expected to prevent off-target movement and damage to non-target crops and other plants. Further state-specific amendments to the registrations occurred in 2022 and 2023.

In response to a lawsuit against EPA concerning these registrations, on February 6, 2024, a ruling by the U.S. District Court of Arizona vacated the 2020 registrations for OTT dicamba products XtendiMax, Engenia, and Tavium. As of February 6, 2024, these products are unregistered, and sale or distribution of these products is unlawful except as provided in EPA's February 2024 existing stocks order.

EXISTING STOCKS ORDER

EPA has issued an Existing Stocks Order to allow for limited sale and distribution of dicamba OTT products that were already in the possession of growers or in the channels of trade and outside the control of pesticide companies as of February 6, 2024. The order also prohibits the use of these dicamba products except where the use is consistent with the previously approved labeling, which included measures intended to reduce environmental damage caused by offsite movement of the pesticide.

growing season and, given the timing of these registrations being vacated, are not able to pivot to another herbicide-tolerant seed and herbicide system.

The issuance of this Existing Stocks Order will help ensure that growers who already possess OTT dicamba and/or have already purchased dicamba-tolerant seeds and thus are reliant on the availability of specific products solely for the 2024 growing season: (I) apply only dicamba formulations designed for use over the top of dicamba-tolerant soybean and cotton, rather than violating FIFRA by misusing more volatile dicamba formulations which could lead to greater offsite movement (and thus potential damage to non-dicamba tolerant crops and other plants); and (2) apply these OTT dicamba products consistent with restrictions intended to reduce offsite movement and protect human health and the environment. Thus, it is necessary for EPA to issue an Existing Stocks Order to ensure that growers follow these directions for use, which were designed to reduce environmental damage caused by offsite movement.

Dicamba was first registered for OTT uses on dicamba-tolerant cotton and soybeans in 2016. In 2017 and again in 2018, EPA amended the registrations of all OTT dicamba products following reports that growers had experienced crop damage and economic losses resulting from the off-site movement of dicamba. The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit vacated the 2018 registrations in June 2020 on the basis that "EPA substantially understated risks that it acknowledged and failed entirely to acknowledge other risks." Days after the court's decision, EPA

This Existing Stocks Order is limited in time and scope, allowing for certain sale, distribution, and use of existing stocks of these formerly-registered dicamba products for the 2024 growing season. EPA has received ample evidence that millions of gallons of OTT dicamba had already entered the channels of trade prior to February 6, 2024. Additionally, most growers have already placed orders for dicamba-tolerant seed for the 2024

Under this order, end users of existing stocks may only use the formerly-registered products consistent with the previously approved labeling for the products and must stop use of these products by the relevant dates laid out in the Order. Additional details regarding restrictions on the sale, distribution, and use of these formerlyregistered products can be found in EPA's Existing Stocks Order for Dicamba Products Previously Registered for Over-the-Top Use on Dicamba-Tolerant Cotton and Soybean.

AIKEN COUNTY ANIMAL QUARANTINED FOR MONITORING OF EQUINE NEUROLOGICAL DISEASE

Clemson University animal health officials quarantined an Aiken County animal after it tested positive for a neurological disease associated with equine herpesvirus, or EHV-1.

The animal was quarantined February 13, after displaying clinical signs including lethargy. Testing by nasal swab confirmed the disease on February 22. The infected animal and its pasture mates will be monitored throughout the quarantine period.

"The infected animal is no longer showing clinical signs with resolution of fever and was likely beyond the infectious stage of the disease by the time we were alerted. Also, the owner of the infected animal is being cooperative, following biosecurity recommendations, and the facility is well-suited for quarantine. This is really a best-case scenario to keep this disease isolated," said Michael Neault, S.C. State Veterinarian, and director of Clemson Livestock Poultry Health.

Animal disease investigators have established that the infected animal and its pasture mates have not come into contact with other equids.

EHV-1 is the primary cause of the neurological disease EHM, or equine herpesvirus myeloencephalopathy. No currently licensed vaccines are labeled for the prevention of EHM.

The disease can be fatal and is mostly spread by direct horse-to-horse contact. Horses may appear to be perfectly healthy yet spread the virus through nasal secretions. The disease can also be spread through tack, wipe rags and other grooming implements, feed and water buckets, and people's clothing.

Symptoms include:

- Fever preceding neurologic signs
- Decreased coordination
- Urine dribbling
- Loss of tail tone
- Hind limb weakness

CLEMSON EXTENSION ANNOUNCES 2024 FORAGES FIELD DAY AND BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES WORKSHOP

BLACKVILLE, S.C. – Forage quality directly impacts animal performance. To help South Carolina livestock owners learn how to provide supplemental feed during the fall and winter months, the Clemson Cooperative Extension Service is offering in-person programs in March.

The 2024 Forages Field Day, slated for March 21, at the Edisto Research and Education Center (REC), 64 Research Road, Blackville, South Carolina 29817, begins with registration at 8:30 a.m.

Cost is \$20. To register, go to <u>bit.ly/2024CU_</u> ForagesFieldDay.

The morning session kicks off with a discussion about carbon credits for forage and livestock operations by keynote speaker and Clemson Extension economist Nathan Smith. Following Smith's presentation, Clemson Extension forages specialist Liliane Silva will discuss adopting climate-smart agricultural practices to strengthen forage-livestock systems. She will also provide research updates from ongoing trials her group is conducting.

The morning session concludes with an update on weed control in forage systems by Mike Marshall, Clemson Extension weed specialist and an update on the livestock market by Matt Fischer, Clemson Extension livestock economist.

Following lunch, afternoon activities will include tours of demonstration plots where Silva and Marshall will give updates on cover crop forage systems research, weed research and management practices, nutrition strategies, nutrient cycling and decomposition in year-round forage systems.

The field day is expected to end at 4 p.m.

A South Carolina New and Beginning Farmer Program advanced level workshop, Best Agricultural Management Practices for Forage-Livestock Systems, will be held March 28, also at the Edisto REC, 64 Research Road, Blackville, SC 29817. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m.

Cost is \$50. To register, go to <u>https://bit.ly/CU_</u> Forages_BMPs.

This program highlights concepts, research and decision tools for South Carolina. The morning session includes a presentation on soil fertility and health by Leo Viera, a Clemson forages postdoctoral fellow, followed by discussions on forage physiology and production and selecting forage species and maintaining perennial grasses by Silva.

Also included in the morning session is a presentation by Matt Hersom, director of the Clemson Piedmont Research and Education Center, about grazing animal nutrition forageinduced animal disorders. Marshall will discuss using practical burning methods for weed management.

Following lunch, outdoor demonstrations will be held. The afternoon session will include a presentation on weed identification and control, as well as proper sprayer calibration and herbicide application by Marshall.

Grazing management applications will be demonstrated at six individual stations. Topics include using a grazing stick to determine forage mass and how much livestock eat each day.

Other topics include forage defoliation frequency and intensity, soil health and improved management strategies to extend grazing days. Stations will feature nutrient cycling, litter decomposition, carbon sequestration, hay bale quality, nutrition, sampling, and weight calculations. In addition, there will also be a station with information about forage field scouting and stand assessment.
